Introduction to Economics

Required Text: Bade/Parkin, *Foundations of Economics*, 8th ed.[older ed. will work]

Description: This is a broad based course designed to introduce the student to the primary principles in both microeconomics and macroeconomics. The first part of this course will overview the economic way of thinking and the primary tools used throughout all of economics. The second part of the course will cover the essential elements and principles of microeconomics, while the third part will cover the essential elements and principles of macroeconomics. Graphs and algebra will be used where necessary to develop the concepts central to economic theory.

Learning Objectives: The student will have learned to understand the fundamentals of economic thought and analysis. Students are taught to clearly perceive economic problems and analyze possible remedies.

Evaluation: There will be three examinations given during the semester. Exams will consist of multiple choice questions taken from class lectures and the textbook. The final exam will be comprehensive. Each exam will be weighted equally, and the highest grade will be counted twice in computing the average for the final grade. Only one (1) make-up exam allowed for the semester.
