<u>Course Description:</u> This is an introductory undergraduate course in macroeconomics, which covers the macro aspects of an economy, such as Gross Domestic Product, Unemployment, Inflation, Monetary and Fiscal Policy. It is a required course for any student contemplating to major or minor in business, economics, or related fields. Students who would like to understand how the U.S. or the world economy in aggregate functions are encouraged to take this course.

<u>Learning Outcomes</u>: By the end of this course, students should be able to learn:

- 1. Gross domestic product or national income
- 2. Unemployment and inflation
- 3. Monetary system-how supply and demand of money is determined, interest rate
- 4. Aggregate demand and supply
- 5. Policies to influence aggregate demand and supply (Monetary and fiscal policy)
