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### **Course Description**

Sex offenders represent a large percentage of the U.S. prison population and offenders on probation. Additionally, over the last few decades there has been a huge increase in the number of registered sex offenders. Few offenses arouse more public disgust, outrage, and policy reaction than sexual offenses. A number of strategies have developed in response to the problem of sexual assault. Along with longer sentences and civil commitment for the most serious offenders, there has been an explosion of techniques for maintaining less serious offenders in the community. Programs ranging from mandated treatment and electronic monitoring to involuntary commitment are in effect. This course provides an overview of sexual offending, etiology, sexual disorders, treatment, and policy.

## **Learning Objectives**

- 1. Develop an understanding of the prevalence and impact of sexual offending.
- 2. To understand the difference between sexual deviance, disorder, and crime.
- 3. To understand and appreciate that sexual offenders are heterogeneous not at all alike.
- 4. To understand the prevalence, characteristics, and recidivism risk of female sex offenders.
- 5. To understand the prevalence, characteristics, and recidivism risk of juvenile sex offenders.
- 6. To understand the characteristics and risk of cyber sex offenders.
- 7. Develop an understanding of the motivation and etiology of sexual offending.
- 8. To understand the assessment and treatment methods of sexual offenders.
- 9. Understand and evaluate the policies of registration and community notification.
- 10. Understand and evaluate sexually violent predator statutes.

# **Student Responsibilities**

There will be four exams in this course. They will consist of multiple-choice items and will cover lectures, readings, discussion, and video clips. Each exam will be worth 50 points. Examinations will not be comprehensive. **No make-up exams will be given**. You can drop your lowest exam score.

### **Participation**

We will use the program TopHat. I will ask you 25 questions during class over the semester. For each question you answer, you will receive a point (whether it is right or not). Sometimes the question will be at the beginning of class, sometimes at the end.
