SUPPLEMENTAL TEXTS: Blackboard

DESCRIPTION OF COURSE: Operation of commercial banks, trust companies, Federal Reserve Banks, and other credit institutions. Federal Reserve Board and its function, rediscounting, open market operations, types of notes issued, and their relation to the Federal Reserve System is stressed. Special attention is given to recent bank legislation. Cases will be used to amplify text materials and allow students to make a practical application of the materials.

OBJECTIVES: The students should learn the following:

TEXT:

- 1. The roles of banks in the financial services industry.
- 2. The specific functions conducted in a bank.
- 3. How to research specific functions in a bank.
- 4. How a bank functions through case studies.

PREREQUISTES: FIN 3310 and FIN 3320

CLASS MEETINGS: Classroom The Woodlands Center beginning on Monday, August 28th, with meetings every Monday at 6:00pm to 8:50pm thru Monday, December 1st and the final exam on Monday, December 4th (See University calendar.)

TEACHING METHOD: The teaching method utilized will be lecture, class discussion, problem analysis, case study, class research and presentation. To introduce an element of practicality into the learning experience, the class will be divided into groups for cases, research papers, and presentations. Students will be allowed to select topics, subject to approval of the professor. A written paper and an oral presentation will be required of each student in the group. You should dress for business when doing your oral presentation.

COURSE EVALUATION PROCESS: There will be three unit examinations and a final examination. In addition there will be outside assignments, a research paper to turn-in and an oral presentation to be made on the research paper. Grade weighting will be as follows:

MISSED EXAM/LATE ASSIGNMENTS: No makeup exam will be given. If an exam is missed, a grade of zero (0) will be assigned for the exam. Each student will be allowed to drop the lowest exam grade (Exam #1 or #2 or #3) provided that they take all three exams. If only one of the three above exams is not taken, then the weight of that exam will be added to the weight of the final exam. If more than one exam is missed, a score of zero (0) will be retained for those missed exams above and exceeding one. **No late assignments will be accepted for credit.**

RELIGIOUS HOLIDAY DAYS POLICY: Students who are absent from class for observance of a religious holy day will be allowed to take an examination or turn-in an assignment schedule for that day prior to the absence. The student, **no later than**September 18th, must notify the professor in writing of each scheduled class day that he/she will be absent for a religious holy day.

For each hour missed from the fourth through the tenth, 1 point will be subtracted from the final grade for each hour missed. Absences totaling more than twelve hours (4 classes) will result in a grade of F for the course. Three late class arrivals will be treated like one hour's absence, and one point will be deducted from the final average.
