Course Description

This course is an introduction to Animal Science and its industries including: beef cattle, dairy cattle, horse, sheep and goat, swine and poultry. After completing this introductory course, students should have knowledge of concepts of selection, breeding, nutrition, management and research as applied to livestock production.

Learning Outcomes After completing this course, students will be able to:

- Demonstrate substantial knowledge of the various segments of the animal science industries.
- Understand the differences between ruminant and non-ruminant metabolism.
- Develop a basic understanding of animal reproduction and reproductive techniques.
- Identify the basic changes that occur during the growth and development of livestock species.
- Understand the life cycle of livestock species from conception to consumption.

Exams & Quizzes

Exams and quizzes may contain multiple-choice, true/false, fill-in-the-blank, short-answer or essay questions. Exam dates will be announced in class at least 1 week before the scheduled date. Inclass quizzes may be unannounced, and may occur at any point during a lecture or lab period. In addition, on-line quizzes may be assigned throughout the semester that must be completed on Blackboard.

Attendance

Students are expected to be in attendance at all class meetings, and attendance will be recorded each class period. Absences for emergencies, illness, or University authorized reasons will be excused with proper documentation from a doctor, professor, or sponsoring organization presented to the instructor within 48 hours of the absence.

If a student has 4 unexcused absences, their final grade may be penalized by 10 percent. Because arriving late to class and leaving early is disruptive to the learning environment, students should strive to be in class throughout the entire class period. Attendance will be recorded at varying times during the lecture or lab period. If a student is not present when attendance is taken, the student will be considered absent.

If a student misses an exam due to an excused absence, the student will be allowed to schedule a make-up exam within 1 week of the absence. The make-up exam may be of a different format than the exam distributed to the rest of the class. Students that miss an exam due to an unexcused absence will not be allowed to take a make-up exam, and a score of zero will be recorded.

Academic Honesty

The University expects all students to engage in all academic pursuits in a manner that is above reproach. Students are expected to maintain complete honesty and integrity in the academic experiences both in and out of the classroom. Any student found guilty of dishonesty in any phase of academic work will be subject to disciplinary action. [5.31] The University and its official representatives, acting in accordance with Subsection 5.32, may initiate disciplinary proceedings against a student accused of any form of academic dishonesty including, but not limited to, cheating,

All guizzes and exams in this course are to be completed independently, and without the aid of outside resources such as textbooks, lecture notes, or internet search engines, unless specifically stated otherwise. Any student found in violation of this policy will receive no credit for that quiz or exam, and may be referred to the department chair and academic dean for further disciplinary action.

Use of any electronic devices during an exam or quiz **for any reason** will be considered use/abuse of resource material, and will also result in a grade of zero on the quiz or exam.

Classroom Conduct Cell phones and other electronic devices must be turned off before class begins. Use of any electronic device for talking, texting, or listening to music during class will result in the student being counted as absent for that class period. Students that have emergencies or a specific need to answer phone calls during class may be exempt from this policy by notifying the instructor prior to the start of class, setting their phone to vibrate, and leaving the room to receive or place a call.

> Behavior in the classroom that is intentionally or unintentionally disruptive is prohibited in order maintain the most effective learning environment for all students in the class. Students may not sleep, read newspapers, listen to music, make offensive remarks, talk at inappropriate times or engage in sidebar conversations with other students, wear inappropriate clothing, or engage in any other form of distraction. Engaging in any of these behaviors during class will result in a directive to leave the classroom, and the student will be counted as absent for that class period. Students who are especially disruptive also may be reported to the Dean of Students for disciplinary action in accordance with university policy.

Classroom Visitors

Classroom visitors are welcome with the prior approval of the instructor based on the presentation of a current and official SHSU ID card, and as long as they do not present a disruption to the class. If the visitor is not a registered SHSU student, approval may be granted on a case-by-case basis.

Religious Holidays

Section 51.911 (b) of the Texas Education Code requires that an institution of higher education excuse a student from attending classes or other required activities, including examinations, for the observance of a religious holy day, including travel for that purpose. A student whose absence is excused under this subsection may not be penalized for that absence and shall be allowed to take an examination or complete an assignment from which the student is excused within a reasonable time after the absence. -Academic Policy Statement 861001.

Electronic Devices

The use by students of electronic devices that perform the function of a telephone or text messaging during class-time may be prohibited if deemed disruptive by the instructor to the conduct of the class. Arrangement for handling potential emergency situations may be granted at the discretion of the instructor. Failure to comply with the instructor's policy could result in expulsion from the classroom or with multiple offenses, failure of the course. Any use of a telephone or text messaging or any device that perform these functions during a test period is prohibited. These devices should not be present during a test period is prohibited. These devices should not be present during a test or should be stored securely in such a way that they cannot be seen or used by the student. Even the

visible presence of such a device during the test period will result in a zero for that test. Use of these devices during a test is considered de facto evidence of cheating and could result in a charge of academic dishonestly.
