COURSE OBJECTIVES:

This course is designed to place emphasis on the scientific principles of turfgrass culture that will provide Professional Golf Management students with a sound basis for communicating with course superintendents to formulate management decisions and methods of operation. Students should become familiar with growth and development of the grass plant and turfgrass communities. While a number of turfgrass species and situations other than those found on golf courses will be discussed, due emphasis will be directed toward the game of golf and specific applications to golf courses. Proper species and cultivar selection and maintenance practices under various uses and environments will be stressed.

This course consists of 2 hours lecture plus 2 hours laboratory per week. Three lecture exams will be given, of which one is the final, covering approximately equal amounts of material and carrying equal weight. The lecture exam average will comprise 65% of the course grade. The laboratory portion of the course grade (35%) will be derived from a combination of lab attendance/participation (15%), lab exercises (15%) and homework assignments (5%).

RECOMMENDED OR REQUIRED READINGS:

Reading assignments covering materials in the text and on the internet, or copies of reference materials posted to BlackBoard or handed out in class will be made regularly. Students are

expected to keep up with readings and will be held responsible for them on examinations or other assignments.

ATTENDANCE POLICY

Regular and punctual attendance to class and lab is expected. My attendance policy will be in accordance to that established by the university. Attendance will be recorded daily. Please do not make a habit of arriving to class late.

MAKEUP POLICY

There will be no makeups for missed laboratory or homework assignments. The lowest lab grade will be dropped. Lecture exam makeups will be administered at the end of the semester, but only with a valid and verifiable excuse.
