Course Description: Identification, growth characteristics, culture and use of annual & perennial landscape plants. Materials include tropical trees and shrubs, herbaceous perennials, annuals, ornamental grasses, ground covers, and bulbs. Both temperate and tropical region plant materials are included.

Course Objectives:

- Identification of selected species based on vegetative & reproductive plant characteristics.
- Basic knowledge of characteristics and environmental adaptability of important native and introduced herbaceous species
- Correct usage of scientific names and terminology to describe plant species.
- Understand the key environmental challenges associated with the use of herbaceous plants in major geographic regions of Texas and the U.S.



LAB points will be earned through quizzes, assignments, and some take home assignments.

There will be approximately ten plant identification quizzes in lab with each quiz covering about 10 to 14 plants. During quizzes, students will list the common name, and <u>Genus species</u> of all plants. The common name is worth 1 point, the <u>Genus species</u> 4 points, for a total of 5 points per plant. Spelling must be correct to receive points.

DEPARTMENT OF AGRICULTURAL SCIENCES ATTENDANCE POLICY

ACADEMIC DISHONESTY

Any student found guilty of dishonesty in any phase of academic work will be subject to disciplinary action. CLASSROOM RULES OF CONDUCT

Students will refrain from behavior in the classroom that intentionally or unintentionally disrupts the learning process and, thus, impedes the mission of the university. Cellular telephones must be turned off before class begins. TELEPHONE AND ELECTRONIC DEVICES

The use by students of electronic devices that perform the function of a telephone or text messager during class-time is prohibited. Arrangements for handling potential emergency situations may be granted at my discretion. Failure to comply with this policy could result in expulsion from the classroom or with multiple offenses, failure of the course.

Any use of a telephone or text messager or any device that performs these functions during a test period is prohibited. These devices should not be present during a test or should be stored securely in such a way that they cannot be seen or used by the student. Even the visible presence of such a device during the test period will result in a zero for that test. Use of these devices during a test is considered de facto evidence of cheating and could result in a charge of academic dishonesty

VISITORS IN THE CLASSROOM

Unannounced visitors to class must present a current, official SHSU identification card to be permitted in the classroom. They must not present a disruption to the class by their attendance. If the visitor is not a registered student, it is at the instructor's discretion whether or not the visitor will be allowed to remain in the classroom.

STUDENT ABSENCES ON RELIGIOUS HOLY DAYS POLICY

Section 51.911(b) of the Texas Education Code requires that an institution of higher education excuse a student from attending classes or other required activities, including examinations, for the observance of a religious holy day, including travel for that purpose. A student whose absence is excused under this subsection may not be penalized for that absence and shall be allowed to take an examination or complete an assignment from which the student is excused within a reasonable time after the absence.

University policy 861001 provides the procedures to be followed by the student and instructor. A student desiring to absent himself/herself from a scheduled class in order to observe (a) religious holy day(s) shall present to each instructor involved a written statement concerning the religious holy day(s). This request must be made in the first fifteen days of the semester or the first seven days of a summer session in which the absence(s) will occur. The instructor will complete a form notifying the student of a reasonable timeframe in which the missed assignments and/or examinations are to be completed.
