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# **Course Description**

This course is a survey of the history of Animation from prephotographic zoetropes through contemporary computer animated special effects and 3D characters. The political, artistic, and social uses of animation will be explored as well as the aesthetics. Prerequisite: ARTS 3385

# **Course Objectives**

The objectives of this course are to

- $\cdot$  give students an overview of the history and development of animation
- · contextualize contemporary trends in this history
- familiarize students with some of the more obscure works of animation
- $\cdot$  demonstrate the political and social uses of animation throughout history
- encourage students to think of animation as an art form and appreciate the aesthetics and expressiveness of animation.

## Methodology

This course will be taught through online assignments that include reading, discussions, and viewing of historical examples of animated movies. Students will have writing projects based on assigned textbook reading and research. Exams will cover material presented in assignments and the text.

Students will be required to watch at 3 full-length films on DVD. These DVD's are available in the Art Resources Library in Art Building E room 113. The Visual Resources Library is open Monday-Friday 8am – 4pm. DVD's cannot be checked out, and must be viewed on site. Students who cannot come to campus to view the DVD's must make other arrangements to view them through purchase or rental. Some may be available online at minimal or no cost if.

#### Assignments, Exams and Grading

This course will be composed of three units.

The **Weekly Units** will include reading assignments from the textbook and online sources, and assigned viewings of animated films. Each Weekly Unit will conclude with a discussion, a short exam or an assignment. There are 12 Weekly Units.

The **Research/Textbook Units** will consist of short writing projects based on Textbook reading assignments. Students will have several weeks to complete each one of these projects. There are 4 Research/Textbook Units. As part of these Units, you will be required to watch some films in the Visual Resources Center or through other sources.

There will be 4 Exams during the semester.

The final grade in the course will be determined by the following formula:

# Student Absences on Religious Holy Days Policy (academic policy 3 861001)

Section 51.911(b) of the Texas Education Code requires that an institution of higher education excuse a student from attending classes or other required activities, including examinations, for the observance of a religious holy day, including travel for that purpose. Section 51.911 (a) (2) defines a religious holy day as: "a holy day observed by a religion whose places of worship are exempt from property taxation under Section 11.20...." A student whose absence is excused under this subsection may not be penalized for that absence and shall be allowed to take an examination or complete an assignment from which the student is excused within a reasonable time after the absence.

University policy 861001 provides the procedures to be followed by the student and instructor. A student desiring to absent himself/herself from a scheduled class in order to observe (a) religious holy day(s) shall present to each instructor involved a written statement concerning the religious holy day(s). The instructor will complete a form notifying the student of a reasonable timeframe in which the missed assignments and/or examinations are to be completed. #### **Department of Art BFA Review**

The purpose of the BFA Review is to ensure that students have learned basic principles and techniques needed for advanced art courses.

All Art students must successfully complete all of the Art Foundation courses and the BFA Review before being accepted into a BFA program in Computer Animation, Photography, or Studio Art or Graphic Design. Graphic Design students must also pass a separate Graphic Design Review after the BFA Review.

The Art Foundation Courses are WASH, Drawing, and Foundations in Digital Art. (ARTS 1313, 1314, 1315, 1316, & 2313). Students must pass each course with a grade of C or higher to take the BFA Review and proceed to upper level courses.

The semester after all of the Foundation courses are complete, students must sign up for the BFA Review. Students should see an art advisor every semester to ensure they take the BFA Review on time. It should be taken the semester immediately following the completion of the Foundation Courses.

Students who do not pass the BFA Review may re-take it the following semester. Students who do not pass on the second attempt will not be allowed to continue as BFA majors, but may follow the degree plan for the BA in Art. Non-participation after signing up or being advised to sign up will count as a failure of that semester's review.

Graphic Design students must pass the BFA Review, complete Principles of Graphic Design (ARTS 2323) and participate in a BFA Review at the end of the semester that they are enrolled in Typography (ARTS 3322).
