

Description

Advanced Typographic Design is a further exploration of expressive visual communication of words that builds on all previous type design and layout experiences. Students will study the interpretation of visible language systems and explore typographic expression. Conceptual interpretation and experimentation will be emphasized as students develop their own voices as authors. Prerequisite: Art 3323. Credit 3

Format

This is a progress-oriented course that requires active student participation. At your instructors discretion, this course may be comprised of lectures, assignments, tests, quizzes, presentations, and participatory activities.

Objectives

- **Developing specific skills, competencies, and points of view needed by professional designers.**
- **Developing creative capacities.**

Further more, this course seeks the advancement of professional working practices including timeliness, attention to detail, presentation and excellence in craft.

Student Responsibilities

- **Regularly check SHSU email and Blackboard.**
- **Participation in class discussions and critiques.**
- **Effective use of in class work time.**
- **On time delivery of all assigned presentations.**
- **Contribution to all group/team projects.**
- **Completion of all assignments on time.**

It is your responsibility to complete projects in a timely, well executed manor, regardless of technical difficulties or supply limitations. A crisis on your part does not necessitate a crisis on the part of your instructor or the Art Department. Planning ahead is smart. Produce your work early. Production the day before or the morning of a deadline is an invitation for anxiety and shoddy workmanship.

Attendance

University Policy

A student shall not be penalized for three or fewer hours of absences when examinations or other assigned class work has not been missed; however, at the discretion of the instructor, a student may be penalized for more than three hours of absences.

Class Policy

Regular and punctual class attendance is expected. Students are expected to be on time, have supplies ready to work in class, and stay for the duration of the class. Arriving late or leaving early will be counted as a 1/4 absence. Evaluation

Students are evaluated on motivation, preparedness, participation, craft and execution. Conceptualization, problem solving, original thinking as well as investigation and understanding of subject matter should be considered essential and will be evaluated as such. Students must show a willingness to share ideas with peers and professor, and be accepting of constructive criticism from all parties.

You should strive to articulate ideas and develop a vocabulary for dealing with design concepts.

Attendance and participation in critiques is expected.

Your participation in this class is vital, and attendance is important and professional. It is expected that you will make every effort to contribute to aspects of this class that extend beyond your personal work and portfolio.

Grading

Work will be evaluated based on the following criteria

- **Ambitiousness, originality, effort, progress**
Are you stopping at the first cliché stop sign, or moving beyond initial ideas. Is the work a half hearted effort or really finished. Do you process criticism and suggestions in an effort to improve your work.
- **Success of visual solution**
The work should be visually engaging, thorough and complete, and communicate clearly. Is the entire thing working together.
- **Workmanship and presentation**
Attention to detail, craftsmanship, handling of materials, cleanliness, spelling, typographic standards, alignment, dimensions. This includes all aspects of a project's presentation
- **Participation, focus, timeliness, professionalism**
A good attitude is fun to work with. Are you attentive, interested, enthusiastic, determined. Do you make a habit of being on time and prepared for class, critiques, reviews, discussions. Do you use class time effectively.

Late work will not be accepted.

Extenuating circumstances are your responsibility and should be discussed, preferably in advance.
