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Overview: In this course we take an expanded look at language paradigms and parsing, common features of programming languages, object-oriented programming, examples of the diversity of programming languages, language support for concurrent and distributed programming, and run-time support for modern programming languages. We will also study the compiler process and understand how compilers are constructed.

The library has several programming language and compiler books that can be used as references. There are also many resources available online. You will be provided other reference material during the semester.

Grading: Grades will be recorded using a point system with 1,000 total points.

There will be two during-semester exams worth 200 points each and a final exam also worth 200 points. Except for extremely unusual circumstances and official absences, no make-up exams will be given.

There will be several programming and homework (non-programming) assignments. There may also be group projects, written assignments and presentations. These assignments will sum to 400 points. I will normally accept late assignments up to one week late with a 20% late penalty however I may announce that an assignment will not be accepted late.

STUDENT ABSENCES ON RELIGIOUS HOLY DAYS POLICY:

Section 51.911(b) of the Texas Education Code requires that an institution of higher education excuse a student from attending classes or other required activities, including examinations, for the observance of a religious holy day, including travel for that purpose. Section 51.911 (a) (2) defines a religious holy day as: "a holy day observed by a religion whose places of worship are exempt from property taxation under Section 11.20...." A student whose absence is excused under this subsection may not be penalized for that absence and shall be allowed to take an examination or complete an assignment from which the student is excused within a reasonable time after the absence.

University policy 861001 provides the procedures to be followed by the student and instructor. A student desiring to absent himself/herself from a scheduled class in order to observe (a) religious holy day(s) shall present to each instructor involved a written statement concerning the religious holy day(s). The instructor will complete a form notifying the student of a reasonable timeframe in which the missed assignments and/or examinations are to be completed.
