<u>Course Overview:</u> Learning is the acquisition of new behaviors as a result of experiences in the environment. This course will examine the discoveries from this area of psychology. In many ways these discoveries form the foundation of much of our other knowledge in psychology. We will also take a look at the controversies that have arisen as a result of how this knowledge has been interpreted. In general, this course is designed to provide you with an understanding of the theoretical and empirical approaches to learning and application of these approaches to human behavior. Goals include:

- 1. Understand and describe the basic principles of learning
- 2. Understand and describe established theories of learning
- 3. Integrate knowledge about learning principles and theories
- 4. Comprehension of how the principles and theories apply to "real-world" human behavior

<u>Course Website</u>: A Blackboard website will be maintained for this course. Enter your SHSU username and password in order to log in to the system. Course announcements, documents, assignments, quizzes, and other relevant information will be posted on this website. Check it frequently for important information! However, please do <u>NOT</u> message me via Blackboard, as I am not checking it regularly. If you need to reach me I recommend email or seeing me in person!

Course Requirements:

Exams: There are <u>four exams</u> covering the reading and lecture content. The lowest exam grade will be dropped, so only three exams will count toward your final grade. Each of these three exams will be worth 20% of your final grade and count for 60% total. Each exam will be closed-book, and you all are expected to abide by the Honor Code and with Academic Honesty at all times. If you are late to an exam, I will allow you to take the exam, as long as you arrive in class before the first person to finish leaves. Once a person has finished and left the classroom, you will not be allowed to take the exam. You are expected to be prepared for

these exams (do your readings in advance, attend each class, utilize any/all resources provided by the instructor, and STUDY). You are responsible for your own success.

Exam Structure: Each exam will be comprised of two portions: Fill-in-the-blank/short answer and Multiple Choice. The Fill-in-the-blank/short answer portions will be first, with the multiple choice questions afterward.

Policy on Make-up Exams: There are no makeup exams. If you miss an exam it will become your dropped exam grade. In order to be fair to all students I cannot make exceptions. If you are involved in a school-sanctioned activity like a sport which requires you to miss the day of the exam you **MUST** inform me within the first two weeks of the first day of school (August 23rd) and provide all necessary documentation as proof. In this case I will permit you to take the exam no more than 48 hours **before** the rest of the class. You will not be allowed to take it after the official exam date. No exceptions.

<u>Quizzes:</u> There will be 10 short quizzes (approximately 10 multiple-choice questions per quiz) posted to Blackboard throughout the semester, corresponding to each chapter. Quizzes will be worth 20% of your grade. Due dates for each quiz are listed on the class schedule. You ARE allowed to use your textbook to complete them, but you are NOT allowed to work on the quizzes with anyone else. You can also take the quizzes as many times as you want to try to get all the points.

<u>In-class Assignments/Participation</u>: In-class assignments will range from a worksheet to something more like a short quiz (or even something as easy as an attendance sheet!). Students must be present in class to receive credit for these assignments, and they cannot be made up. These in-class assignments will not be announced. They are worth 20% of your grade
