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Course Title: CSTE 1330: Introduction to Computers for Business Majors

Hours/Location: Virtual

Course Description

This is a computer literacy course. Basic computing concepts are presented. Assignments provide a hands-on experience in using microcomputer applications. Multimedia and the Internet are introduced. May not be taken for credit toward a COSC major or minor. This course may be taken as a classroom based course or as an Independent Study/Internet course. Credit 3.

Course goals

The goal of this class is to ensure that students have a basic to intermediate understanding and competence with general computer systems with an emphasis on computer skills needed in a business environment. A heavy emphasis will be placed on the Microsoft Word and Excel software programs since these are the industry standard applications in the business world.

Objectives include (but not limited to):

- Basic Computer Concepts
- Basic Internet Concepts
- Basic/Intermediate Word Concepts
- Basic/Intermediate Excel Concepts
- Intermediate PowerPoint Concepts

If you work with anyone else, make sure and notify the instructor to prevent unintentionally facing disciplinary action that might range from a zero on the assignment to an F in the class to expulsion from the university.

Classroom Conduct

Students in this course are expected to be professional, tactful, and courteous when communicating with the instructor and other classmates. In the online course, most communication is written, and non-verbal cues (facial expressions, hand gestures, voice tone, etc.) are not visible; therefore, students must be cognizant of this and pay careful attention to the way their messages appear to others when read. Also, proper capitalization, spelling, and grammar are required in all communication and assignments. Students will not gain credit for graded assignments and discussions that are poorly written and that include abbreviations commonly used in chat and texting.
