COURSE OVERVIEW:

The course, **Practicum I**, is designed to provide the graduate student with an, an opportunity to integrate theory and practice, and a thorough overview of APA ethical standards as related to psychotherapy. The first practicum course requires more practice with the micro-skills first taught in Techniques of Psychotherapy, PSYC 6390.

FINAL GRADE:

Based on: (1) degree of skill developed from beginning to end of semester; grades on exams; supervision averages; completion of all assignments with a score of ≥ 80 .

ATTENDANCE POLICY:

TIME REQUIREMENT

For each graduate hour attempted, at least three hours outside class is expected. This 3-credit-hour course will meet 3 hours each week. That leaves 9 hours outside of class in which to read, meet with volunteer clients, attend your volunteer site, attend supervision, and complete assignments. A practicum frequently requires more hours per week. It is expected that if you enrolled in this graduate course, you can meet the time requirements.

STUDENT ABSENCES ON RELIGIOUS HOLY DAYS POLICY

Section 51.911(b) of the Texas Education Code requires that an institution of higher education excuse a student from attending classes or other required activities, including examinations, for the observance of a religious holy day, including travel for that purpose. Section 51.911(a)(2) defines religious holy days as: "a holy day observed by a religion whose places of worship are exempt from property taxation under Section 11.20, Tax Code."

A student whose absence is excused under this subsection may not be penalized for that absence and shall be allowed to take an examination or complete an assignment from which the student is excused within a reasonable time after the absence.

University policy 861001 provides the procedures to be followed by the student and instructor. A student desiring to absent himself/herself from a scheduled class in order to observe (a) religious holy day(s) shall present to each instructor involved a written statement concerning the religious holy day(s). The instructor will notify the student of a reasonable timeframe in which the missed assignments and/or examinations are to be completed. CLASSROOM VISITORS

Only registered students may attend class. Exceptions can be made on a case-by-case basis by the professor because much of what we do in class is confidential. In all cases, visitors must not present a disruption to the class by their attendance. Students wishing to audit a class must apply to do so through the Registrar's Office.

CLASSROOM RULES OF CONDUCT

Any disorderly classroom conduct that obstructs, interferes with, inhibits and/or disrupts teaching and/or related classroom activities is prohibited. Persons in the classroom engaging in such conduct will be asked to leave. Failure to the leave the classroom will result in University Police being requested to come to the classroom to assist with the removal of the person. This area relates to Professionalism.

COURSE REQUIREMENTS

Students will be required to practice the basic psychotherapy skills with 40 hours of face-to-face contact with volunteer clients. Fifty-seven hours of volunteer work is also required. Clinical psychology students typically volunteer in a clinical agency/setting. Volunteer hours may also be achieved by being a volunteer client with a peer counselor or by attending your own personal therapy. The total of 150 hours will include the supervision and class hours. Presentations and additional projects will also be required of each student to hone skills for professional settings.

SUPERVISION

A portion of your evaluation consists of your ability to receive supervision and make necessary adjustments. Preparation for supervision sessions with tapes cued, transcripts completed correctly with *shoulda'* saids, and all other paper-work (journal and assent forms) completed is imperative. The ability to accept and make adjustments through supervision is extremely important in training. Your readiness to advance in your program will be determined, in part, by your response to supervision. Refusal to follow supervisor's directives may result in course failure.

INDIVIDUAL RESEARCH

To receive an "A" in the course, you must write a literature review of an approved topic related to Practicum I (ethics, multicultural competence, professionalism with clients, and treatment for a specific area/disorder). As a professional, you will need to share your research results with your colleagues. Your presentation will indicate your success with the assignment and will make you eligible for an **A.** A rubric is provided.

CLASS PARTICIPATION

Class participation in role plays and class discussions is expected as an avenue to meet the course objectives and relates to Professionalism. **PLEASE BRING A DIGITAL DEVICE TO ACCESS APA CODE OF ETHICS LINK.** All speech during class must be grammatically correct or will be corrected by the instructor. You are training to be professionals!

TRANSCRIPTS

Until the Mastery form has been completed, students must transcribe a tape of their choice to demonstrate their skills. Students will want to transcribe 15-20 minutes of the session that demonstrates skill development. The tape should be cued to the beginning of the transcript when arriving for supervision. To obtain full credit for "Prepared for Supervision," each transcript must also include "should'a saids." Submitting assent forms and an audio-tape/video-tape also relate to "Prepared for Supervision" element.

PROGRESS ASSESSMENTS

Two progress assessments will be administered during the semester. One is multiple choice (similar to the EPPP, required for licensure; the other is a take-home Final Exam (Texas Law). Both will be administered via Blackboard. You will have two chances to take each exam, should you want to improve your initial grade.

PRESENTATIONS

One individual presentation will be required: the Review of Literature, related to a topic in Practicum I. A rubric will be provided on Blackboard to guide preparation of the Literature Review. There will be no PowerPoints for the presentation. The only visual you may have is a one-page handout, which can have no mechanical writing errors.


COURSE EVALUATION

All hours except the 40 face-to-face can be negotiated with the instructor.
