Objective: This course is designed for those students who need preparation beyond two years of high school geometry before taking the calculus sequence. In this course the student is expected to obtain an understanding of:

- The principles involved in the algebra of real and complex numbers
- The concept of a function and how to use algebraic and geometric properties to study properties of functions
- How to use functions and algebraic principles to model and solve real-world problems

Description: Topics include a brief review of introductory algebra, variation, elementary theory of equations, functions (including exponential and logarithmic) inequalities, systems of equations, and other related topics. Prerequisites: Two years of high school algebra and one year of high school geometry. Credit 3.

Textbook: College Algebra, 8th edition, by Aufmann

Exams, Quizzes/Homework, Final Exam, and Grade: There will be *quizzes/homework*, *3 exams (if time permits), and a comprehensive final exam*. Due dates, quiz dates, exam dates, etc. will be posted on Blackboard. The final class average is calculated as follows:

Homework average 35% Exam average 45% (15% each) Final exam (comprehensive) 20%

Unless you have a medical emergency, homework cannot be submitted by email and must be handed in person to me the day it is due. You cannot make-up a homework assignment or quiz. You will be allowed to make-up an exam only in the case of an excused absence (see below).

Calculator: You must have a calculator that can evaluate roots, powers, exponentials, and logarithms (a scientific calculator will do this). You cannot use your cell phone as a calculator. You cannot borrow a calculator during a quiz or an exam. You may usually use a graphing calculator on an exam, but will not be allowed to use a graphing calculator on parts of some exams.

During an exam, your cell phone should be stored securely in such a way that it cannot be seen or used. The visible presence of such a device during an exam may result in a zero on the exam and is considered de facto evidence of cheating.

Attendance: You should make every effort to attend all classes. If you are absent from class or know you will be absent from class, please notify me (in person, via phone message or email) as soon as possible as to the nature of your absence. An absence is excused only in cases of medical emergencies, death in the family, or school sponsored events. To excuse an absence, you must provide the following:

- 1) A written note with the dates of your absence, the date that you returned to class, and the reason for the absence.
- 2) A document to verify the reason for your absence (e.g. signed doctor's note)

The written excuse must be provided to me no later than the day that you return to class.
