TEXTBOOOK: College Algebra by N Aufmann and Richard D. Nation

Calculator: scientific calculator.

COURSE OBJECTIVES: This course is designed for those students who need preparation beyond two years of high school geometry before taking the calculus sequence. In this course, the student is expected to obtain an understanding of:

- The principles involved in the algebra of real and complex numbers
- The concept of a function and how to use algebraic and geometric properties to study properties of functions
- How to use functions and algebraic principles to model and solve real-world problems

Description: Topics include a brief review of introductory algebra, variation, elementary theory of equations, functions (including exponential and logarithmic) inequalities, systems of equations, and other related topics. Prerequisites: Two years of high school algebra and one year of high school geometry. Credit 3.

GRADING POLICY

QUIZZES: Every Week there is a short quiz based on on previous homework. The quizzes will be closed book and closed notes. There will be no make-up quizzes.

ACTIVE LEARNING & HOMEWORK: Students are asked to read the textbook and try and do the assigned problems prior to the class. Every Friday random students has to go to the board and explain what they understood about the homework problems. Based on his written work and explanations, points will be added and if the called student is not present, no marks will be given.

Please Note- You are highly encouraged to work as groups, get help from your classmates to do your homework, even use their work as a reference but expect to write the answer in your own words, refer online sources but you have to understand the concepts and not allowed to copy it as it is. Also you have to mention your reference. Your understanding will be evaluated when you ask to explain the problems in front of the class. Also helping your classmates are highly appreciated. EXAMS: Many exam problems will be similar to Homework problems, Quiz problems or worked examples in the class.
