Objective: You will learn to analyze, logically address, and solve problems.

Description: Topics may include sets, counting principles, probability, logic, linear algebra, linear programming, number systems, and mathematics of finance, geometry, and calculus.

Prerequisites: Two years of high school algebra and high school geometry.

Textbook: *Mathematics: A Practical Odyssey*, 8th edition, by David B. Johnson and Thomas A. Mowery

Homework Worksheets: Homework will be assigned periodically. Homework will not be collected, but your completing the assignment will be directly affect your quiz grades because the questions in the weekly quizzes will look like the homework problems.

Exams, Quizzes/Homework, Final Exam, and Grade: There will be *three exams, quizzes/homework, and a comprehensive final exam*. Many exam problems will be similar to homework problems or examples worked in class. The final exam will be cumulative. If you arrive late to an exam, you may still take the exam in the remaining time as long as nobody has finished the exam yet. No exam grades will be dropped, and there will be no do-overs.

Exam make-up policy: If you miss an exam, you will be expected to show appropriate cause in writing. If you must miss an exam, I expect you to contact me beforehand. If that is impossible, then you must contact me no later than 24 hours after the exam. If you miss an exam and have not contacted me by this time, you forfeit your right to a make-up.

You cannot make-up an exam, homework assignment or quiz except in cases of **documented** emergencies. Missing assignments are given zero points. Homework assignments/due dates and all exam dates will be posted on Blackboard. There will be

weekly 15 minutes quizzes **every Thursday** at the end of the class. The lowest quiz/homework grade will be dropped. The weights are as follows:

- Exam average **60% (20% each)**,
- Quiz/homework average **10%** (drop the lowest quiz/homework grade),
- Final exam (comprehensive) **30%**

The date/time of the final exam is set by official SHSU policy. Although I do not expect any other exam dates to change, all other dates in this list are tentative and subject to change.

The letter grades will be assigned based on your weighted average according to the following scheme: 90 to 100 = A, 80 to 89 = B, 70 to 79 = C, 60 to 69 = D and 0 to 59 = F. A grade of D is passing, but does not necessarily satisfy degree requirements. **Please keep in mind that there is no additional curve in this class, and no extra credit.**

Calculators: You might have a calculator for this class but you cannot use your cell phone as a calculator in the class. Your calculator must be able to evaluate roots, powers, exponentials, and logarithms (a scientific calculator will do this). It is **ABSOLUTELY NOT ALLOWED** to use calculator during the quizzes, exams and final.

Use of Phones and Text Messengers in Class: Generally speaking, you may not use cell phones, computers, or other devices capable of communication in class. The one exception is that during lecture periods, you may keep your cell phone on vibrate so that you can receive text messages in case of an emergency. You may not, however, be distracted or distracting to others in checking your text messages in class, and you may not send text messages in class. All messengers must be put away for exams. SHSU Academic Policy Statement 100728 states that *even the visible presence of such a device during the test period will result in a zero for that test. Use of these devices during a test is considered de facto evidence of cheating and could result in a charge of academic dishonesty.*

Further Notes:

Attendance - You should attend all classes and are responsible for all announcements, assignments, quizzes, and exams given in class. Attendance and participation in the mathematics class is critical for success. Please bring a notebook to class and take notes of the lecture, discussion and examples worked in class. Writing down these notes (and possibly rewriting them later) is an important part of the learning process.

If you miss a class, then I expect you to get notes from a classmate. I expect you to arrive to class on time. **You should check Blackboard and your email every day.**

Miscellaneous Information -

- Cheating is a most serious offense - I will not hesitate to press for the most severe consequence allowed by the University. YOU WILL ALSO RECEIVE an “F” FOR THE CLASS.
- I will use the class website on blackboard to post grades, announcements and etc.
- Issues that are not addressed politely and respectfully will not be addressed.
- No hats, headphones, or sunglasses are permitted during Exams or quizzes.
- No work, no credit, therefore, show all work. My rule of thumb is, if I cannot do it in my head, it is likely neither could or did you.
- Your cell phone needs to be turned off or on silent, not vibrate. Most importantly, it must be out of sight during class. A cell phone out during an exam will be considered cheating. You may not use your cell phone as a calculator.
- Please check your campus email regularly or forward your campus email to an email that you check regularly.
- Be respectful of the student around you at all times.
- Make sure you have read the syllabus carefully because you are responsible for what lies within it.
