This course includes an introduction to sets, logic, the axiomatic method and proof. Writing enhanced. Credit 3. Prerequisite: Grade of C or better in MATH 1430 or consent of instructor.

Grade

Your final grade will be based on a weighted average of homework assignments and quizzes, 2 midterm exams, and a comprehensive final exam. The weights are as follows:

Homework/Quiz Average: 25% (drop the lowest homework grade),

Exams: 25% each,

Comprehensive Final Exam: 25%

Homework assignments and quiz dates will be posted on Blackboard in an assignment table. The final exam is not optional. Make-up exams and make-up homework assignments are only allowed in cases of excused absences (see attendance policy below). You cannot re-take an exam and there are no extra credit assignments.

Typing Homework Some of the homework problems must be typed. These problems will be labled with an asterisk in the assignment table that is posted on blackboard. I will provide a IATEXtemplate. I will encourage students to use www.overleaf.com as a IATEXplatform, but you are welcome to use any compiler that you are familiar with. You may also type your assignments using Word, Open Office, or Google Drive.

Many of the homework assignments will involve writing or constructing proofs. Mathematical proofs will be graded on the following scale:

Additional Notes
