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Course Description: This class is designed to introduce the student to a number of new and innovative games and activities which are normally not included as part of the traditional kinesiology curriculum which is offered within the public schools. Students will also learn the principles upon which these different activities are created so that they may devise new games using their own imaginations. The rhythmic portion of the course will include experiences in basic pattern identification. These will be applied to selected activities such as jumping rope, choreography, and involvement of manipulative movement.

Course Format:

This is an activity-based course **requiring** your participation.

Course Requirements:

After completion of the course students will be able to:

- 1. Understand the principles upon which new and innovative games are based
- 2. Create and share a new innovative game and rhythmic activities
- 3. Use resources to locate new or innovative games and rhythmic activities created by other professionals
- 4. Take existing games and modify them to produce a new innovative game and rhythmic activities

Grades:

All assignments will be graded based on a rubric. At the end of the semester, the grades on any assignments will be averaged to equal the final grade.

Attendance/Tardiness Policy:

Essential to your understanding of the material is your presence and participation. Regular attendance is **mandatory**. If you should miss any class, it is your responsibility to make up any work that was missed and prepare for the next class period. Please see your Student Handbook to see what constitutes an excused absence. Official documentation is required for any absence to be excused. This documentation must be presented to the instructor within 7 days of the absence. At the beginning of each class, attendance will be taken. It is your responsibility to make sure you are written down as being present, especially if you arrive late. According to University policy, more than three absences will affect your grade in the following manner:

4 absences 5 absences 6 absences 7 absences reduction of one letter grade reduction of two letter grades reduction of three letter grades failure of this section of the course

Arriving on time for class and remaining in class until the end of the class is required if you would like to be counted present that day. Because of its importance, a combination of 2 tardies and/or early exiting will be counted as 1 absence for the class.

Be on time. It takes self-discipline to do so. Demonstrate that you have what it takes to be counted on by others.

Classroom Rules of Conduct: Students will refrain from behavior in the classroom that intentionally or unintentionally disrupts the learning process and, thus, impedes the mission of the university. Cell phones and iPods must be turned off before class begins. Students caught using their cell phones will be asked to leave and receive and absence for that class day.

Students are prohibited from eating in class, using tobacco products, making offensive remarks, reading newspapers, sleeping, talking at inappropriate times, wearing inappropriate clothing (must follow REC clothing attire rules), or engaging in any other form of distraction. Inappropriate behavior in the

classroom shall result in a directive to leave class. Students who are especially disruptive also may be reported to the Dean of Students for disciplinary action in accordance with university policy.

Dress:

You must come dressed in athletic clothing every day if you do not want to be counted absent for the class (must follow REC clothing attire rules). There will be no jeans, flip flops, or boots allowed in the gym.

Injury/Sick:

If you are injured or sick and are unable to participate in class, you must provide documentation prior to the beginning of class stating that you are unable to participate.

Absences on Religious Holy Days: University policy states that a student who is absent from class for the observance of a religious holy day must be allowed to take an examination or complete an assignment scheduled for that day within a reasonable time after the absence. Student must be excused to travel for observance of a religious holy day. A student who wishes to be excused for a religious holy day must present the instructor

with a written statement describing the holy day(s) and the travel involved. The instructor should provide the student with a written description of the deadline for the completion of missed exams or assignments.

STUDENT ABSENCES ON RELIGIOUS HOLY DAYS POLICY:

Section 51.911(b) of the Texas Education Code requires that an institution of higher education excuse a student from attending classes or other required activities, including examinations, for the observance of a religious holy day, including travel for that purpose. Section 51.911 (a) (2) defines a religious holy day as: "a holy day observed by a religion whose places of worship are exempt from property taxation under Section 11.20...." A student whose absence is excused under this subsection may not be penalized for that absence and shall be allowed to take an examination or complete an assignment from which the student is excused within a reasonable time after the absence.

University policy 861001 provides the procedures to be followed by the student and instructor. A student desiring to absent himself/herself from a scheduled class in order to observe (a) religious holy day(s) shall present to each instructor involved a written statement concerning the religious holy day(s). The instructor will complete a form notifying the student of a reasonable timeframe in which the missed assignments and/or examinations are to be completed.
