Course Description: An integration of economic tools of analysis with optimization techniques such as calculus, LaGrangian multipliers and linear programming. Additionally, students are exposed to risk analysis and decision-making under uncertainty, inventory control, profitability analysis, and capital budgeting. Prerequisites: ECON 2300 or 2302, BANA 3363.

Learning Objectives: Upon completion of this course, the student will have learned

- 1. To apply quantitative techniques to problems in business and economics.
- 2. To use the tools of game theory to analyze strategic interdependence among firms
- 3. To derive rules for decision making under conditions of risk and uncertainty.

Text: Samuelson & Marks, *Managerial Economics*, 8th Ed (but 6th or 7th will do). **Other Resources:** Tutoring may be available; schedule TBA.

Grading: There will be four exams worth at least 100 points each toward your final grade, for a base total of 400 points

Grade Determination:

A: 360 points (90% of 400)

Note: There is no "rounding". 319 points, for example, is still a "C".

Student Absences on Religious Holy Days Policy

Section 51.911(b) of the Texas Education Code requires that an institution of higher education excuse a student from attending classes or other required activities, including examinations, for the observance of a religious holy day, including travel for that purpose. A student whose absence is excused under this subsection may not be penalized for that absence and shall be allowed to take an examination or complete an assignment from which the student is excused within a reasonable time after the absence.

University policy 861001 provides the procedures to be followed by the student and instructor. A student desiring to absent himself/herself from a scheduled class in order to observe (a) religious holy day(s) shall present to each instructor involved a written statement concerning the religious holy day(s). This request must be made in the first fifteen days of the semester or the first seven days of a summer session in which the absence(s) will occur. The instructor will complete a form notifying the student of a reasonable time during which the missed assignments and/or examinations are to be completed.
