REQUIRED MATERIALS:

1. Text: *Intermediate Accounting*, <u>9th</u> *edition*, by Spiceland, Nelson, Thomas; published by McGraw-Hill/Irwin.

Both of these items may be purchased online, directly from the publisher – If purchasing online, you must first purchase <u>AND PAY</u> for Connect access (for \$125), and then you will have the option to upgrade to the loose-leaf text (for an additional \$80.) You will have instant access to the e-book until the loose-leaf arrives.

COURSE DESCRIPTION:

A thorough study of the accounting principles underlying the preparation of financial statements. This course is concerned primarily with the recording process, formats of the financial statements, and the measurement and reporting of current and non-current assets and related revenues and expenses. The environment of accounting and basic accounting theory are emphasized.

COURSE OBJECTIVES:

Upon completion of this course:

- 1. The student will have a broad awareness of basic financial accounting concepts.
- 2. The student will understand the FASB Conceptual Framework and its limitations.
- 3. The student will comprehend the accounting cycle including the recording of transactions and the preparation of the Income Statement and Balance Sheet.
- 4. The student will be able to measure and report cash and short-term receivables.
- 5. The student will understand inventory valuation and reporting including cost flow assumptions and estimating techniques.
- 6. The student will be able to account for long-lived assets including acquisitions, subsequent expenditures, disposals, depreciation/depletion, intangible assets, and impairment of property, plant and equipment and intangibles.

COURSE EVALUATION PROCESS:

Final course grades will be computed based on the percentage of these 450 points earned. The following grading scale will be used: 90%, 80%, 70%, and 60% for an A, B, C, and D respectively. Any score below 60% is an F. Course grades will be computed according to the above scale and will not be negotiated. Grades: you earn them, I just record them.

Makeup Policy:

You are expected to take the exams as scheduled. <u>There will be NO makeup exams</u>. However, a comprehensive final exam may replace the lowest unit exam score, if higher. There are no makeup in-class assignment or quiz grades.

TECHNOLOGY:

Use of technology is an integral part of this course. You will need to allow yourself time to become comfortable with the software that we are using. You will also need to allow time to use the computers on campus if you do not have access to the internet from another computer.

1. Blackboard: Enter Blackboard from the Sam homepage (www.shsu.edu). Click on the link for this course. For your convenience, I have made the following items available on blackboard: Syllabus, Assignments, Class Materials (to be printed out for each class), ONLINE LECTURES (for selected chapters), test grades, and periodically announcements pertaining to class. I will also use Blackboard to e-mail information to the class. Blackboard is a very convenient tool and every attempt will be made to keep Blackboard updated. However, in no case should Blackboard be considered a substitute for class attendance, unless an online lecture is scheduled for that day. Students that do not view online lectures and complete out of class handouts are likely to fall behind in the course. Students are responsible for all announcements, materials, and assignments given in class whether they are posted on Blackboard or not.

2. Connect Accounting is an e-learning program that corresponds with this course. Registration for the online homework program is <u>mandatory for earning homework points</u>. Quizzes/In-class assignments:

25 points will be based on quizzes, and in-class assignments. This may consist of in-class or take-home quizzes or assignments, group work, etc. The best way to earn a high score for your quiz/in-class grade is to have <u>excellent attendance</u>, and be <u>prepared</u> for each class meeting. There will be no make-ups if you are not in class for a quiz or an in-class assignment.

CELL PHONES:

Use of cell phones during class is strictly prohibited. Cell phones should be turned off and be kept out of sight. Not only is the use of a cell phone during class **extremely rude and disrespectful to your instructor**, it can also be a major distraction to your professor and to your fellow students. Cell phones should not be in use during class for any reason. Phones should be off or silenced and stowed away. If there is an extenuating circumstance that requires you to be "on call" and in need of your phone during class, please let me know before class begins. Texting or other use of cell phones during class will be considered a violation of class policy and your grade may be impacted for texting during class. Per University Academic Policy Statement 100728:

Any use of a telephone or text messager or any device that performs these functions during a test period is prohibited. These devices should not be present during a test or should be stored securely in such a way that they cannot be seen or used by the student. Even the visible presence of such a device during the test period will result in a zero for that test. Use of these devices during a test is considered de facto evidence of cheating and could result in a charge of academic dishonesty (see student code of conduct http://www.shsu.edu/students/guide/StudentGuidelines2010-2012.pdf#page=29).

CLASSROOM CIVILITY:

Students are expected to assist in maintaining a classroom environment that is conducive to learning. In order to assure that all students have an opportunity to gain from time spent in class, unless otherwise approved by the professor, students are prohibited from using cellular phones or beepers, eating in class, making offensive remarks, reading newspapers, using laptop computers, sleeping, talking among each other at inappropriate times or engaging in any other form of distraction. Inappropriate classroom conduct, for example, the reading or sending of text messages during class, can result in the immediate dismissal of the student from the class. **Please turn off your cell phone and put it away before class begins!**

ACADEMIC DISHONESTY: Students are expected to maintain honesty and integrity in the academic experiences both in and out of the classroom. In other words: No Cheating. Business and Accounting Ethics are an extension of personal ethics. To develop strong business ethics, be personally responsible and ethical right now. Note that violation of academic honesty can affect the course grade. "Cheating" on an exam (i.e., the giving or receiving of aid) may result in a course grade of "F."

ATTENDANCE POLICY: Regular and **punctual** class attendance is expected and you should be **prepared**, with your materials (book) during each class meeting. Attendance will be checked at the beginning of each class. Students arriving late (which should be a rare occurrence) will have been marked absent and it is the student's responsibility to see the instructor before leaving class to get the record changed. While attendance will not directly affect the computation of the final grade, attendance is an indicator of the amount of interest and effort a student is willing to exert in learning and will be used in borderline grade decisions. Most importantly, this course contains subject matter which is extremely difficult to master without **excellent attendance**.

HELPFUL HINTS: This is not a "readings" course. You can only learn accounting by studying each chapter carefully and by **doing your homework**. All homework will be completed on-line via Connect Accounting. Completing the homework in a timely manner is the best way to prepare for exams. The material in this course cannot be mastered by attending class only, by reading chapters only, or by doing homework only. All three activities are the minimum required to perform well in this course. **Advance preparation** is the key to getting the most out of our class time together. **You should read each chapter BEFORE** that chapter is lectured on in class.

CALCULATORS:
