## **REQUIRED TEXT:**

<u>Cost Accounting</u>, Michael R. Kinney and Cecily A. Raiborn, Cengage Learning, 9<sup>th</sup> Edition.

### **COURSE DESCRIPTION:**

This course provides a study of cost accounting principles and techniques of assembling data for product costing and for managerial use in planning, control and decision making. Cost terminology, cost behavior, job order and process costing, budgeting, cost-volume-profit analysis, standard costs, and activity-based costing are topics covered. This course includes the study of managerial accounting concepts, analyses, and applications. An emphasis is placed on how costs impact decision-making and product planning.

## **COURSE OBJECTIVE:**

The objective of this course is to provide a strong foundation for future courses. During the semester, students will:

- 1. Develop specific skills, competencies, and points of view needed by professionals in accounting;
- 2. Gain factual knowledge (terminology, classifications, methods, trends);
- 3. Learn fundamental principles, generalizations, or theories.

The content of this course complies with the assessment objectives as outlined in the current Department of Accounting Assessment Plan.

Upon completion of this course students will have learned the:

- 1. Fundamentals of cost terminology and behavior;
- 2. Principles of allocating costs using various allocation rates;
- 3. Techniques of costing products using job-order, process, and standard costing;
- 4. Basics of responsibility costing and service department cost allocations;
- 5. Basics of joint costs and accounting for by-products/scrap;
- 6. Value of CVP and relevant information for decision making; and
- 7. Fundamentals of cost analysis for decision making.

In-class assignments will also be made throughout the semester. If you work on these during the allotted class time you do not have to turn them in to earn the points. If you leave class early or miss class, the assignment is due the next class and points will be awarded based on completeness (including all work for calculations) and accuracy. These assignments will <u>not</u> be accepted after that time. You are allowed to drop the lowest inclass score.
