Course Description

This course will provide a basic overview of United States Supreme Court case briefs relating to incarceration and corrections. It will include discussions about court cases decided by the Supreme Court through June 2008, and how the Constitution impacts confinement. In the end, it is hoped that you will come away with a better understanding of the types of cases offenders (prisoners) file, and how such cases impact corrections and the incarceration of offenders.

Course Objectives

1. Explore the relationship between the United States Constitution and the confinement of offenders.

2. Discover how offender case filings result in decisions by the Supreme Court.

3. Understand case brief terminology and definitions.

4. Relate Supreme Court cases to current correctional policies and procedures.
