Course Description:

This course is designed to help you get an understanding of theories and principles relative to professional ethics in Criminal Justice. Students will acquire a conceptual understanding of what ethics and morality mean, and how these concepts are extremely relative in the field.

Course Goals and Objectives:

The student will learn about a variety of terms and the complexity of ethical dilemmas associated

with these Criminal Justice. Students will become better informed as practitioners when dealing with the vast array of unique circumstances encountered within their field. Some of the objectives for this course include the following:

- 1. Understand fundamental theories of Ethics relative to the field of criminal justice.
- 2. Understand various types of ethical dilemmas and their characteristics;
- 3. Learn response strategies associated with value conflicts;
- 4. Analyze and critique decisions when faced with a dilemma in the field;
- 5. Understand administrative issues and considerations for members of the supervisory component in Criminal Justice.
