COURSE OBJECTIVES:

- A. Students will demonstrate proper conducting posture.
- B. Students will demonstrate effective use of beating.
- C. The following techniques will be the primary sources for the proper development of conducting gesture, baton technique, non-verbal communication, score-study, and musical interpretation.
 - a. Saito Conducting Method
 - b. Malko Conducting/Body Exercises
 - c. Laban Body Movement and Conducting Gesture
 - d. Musin Technique
 - e. Rodolph Technique (Legato, Staccato, Tenuto, Marcato, Non Expressive)
 - f. Fluency in preparatory gestures, legato and staccato styles, various beat patterns, facial expressions
 - g. Techniques for subdividing, ritardandos, accelerandos
- D. Students will develop their abilities to score-study while refining their basic skills of musicianship (rhythm, pitch, harmony, form)

<u>CLASS ORCHESTRA CONDUCTING</u>: All students will play in the class ensemble. Group chamber ensembles will be assigned for video homework assignments. Scores used for in class conducting should be marked with harmonic and phrasal analysis (based on the students current knowledge).

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PSYCHOLOGICAL CONDUCTING: Composition requirements will be handed out in class.

WRITTEN ASSIGNMENTS: Must be double-spaced, typed with a standard 1" margin (top, bottom, left, and right), and a standard font.

GRADING POLICY:

ABSENCES:

Like an ensemble course, conducting class operates as a cooperative-learning environment. The success of your development as a conductor is dependent upon every student's participation in every class.

Absence due to illness or emergency will be considered excused with written documentation. Students are permitted 1 unexcused absence. After the first unexcused absence, the student's grade will drop by half a letter grade. 2 tardies will be considered 1 unexcused absence. ABSENCES AND TARDIES HAVE A DETRIMENTAL EFFECT ON FINAL GRADES.

ASSIGNMENTS:

Students will have multiple in-class conducting assignments throughout the semester. Students must be prepared for each assignment. NO MAKE-UP conducting assignments will be available unless a valid excused absence is granted.

Homework assignment will be accepted for partial credit up to 1 week past the due date.

CLASSROOM CONDUCT:

In order to create a classroom environment that encourages critical thinking and creativity, courteous and encouraging conduct is expected from all students at all times. This includes attentive listening, respectful language, and a willingness to consider new ideas or opinions. All students are expected to participate in class discussions. The use of electronic devices not needed for class participation, reading materials other than class materials, or work for another class are never appropriate in class.

PHYSICAL CONTACT:

The study of conducting necessitates occasional, limited physical contact between instructor and student. The instructor will always be respectful and observant of each student's comfort level. A student with any questions or concerns should discuss this matter with the instructor prior to class.

INDIVIDUAL PRACTICE:

A successful student will practice conducting daily. In addition to refining and developing your conducting gestures, your daily practice should include basic movement exercises and musicianship building.
