COURSE DESCRIPTION:

This course is an examination of how to improve the ability to communicate through more effective use of the voice. This will be achieved through exploring the basic processes of voice, speech, movement and acting and how they can be further integrated and unified for the performer.

CLASS OBJECTIVES:

- 1. To open the actor's range of speech and vocal choices beyond the habitual.
- 2. To identify each individual's specific speech patterns and begin to address means to expand beyond perceived limitations.
- 3. To prepare the actor for the speech challenges presented by performed text.
- 4. To establish a working knowledge of IPA.
- 5. To work through problems in breathing, resonance, and articulation for each individual student.

ATTENDANCE POLICY:

Class participation is an important part of class, so it is imperative that you attend all classes. If you are absent from more than **three (3)** classes, your final grade will be reduced by **two (2)** points for <u>each</u> absence. Tardiness is unacceptable. If you are tardy **three (3)** times, that equals **one absence**. Excessive tardiness will result in a reduction of your final grade.

PREPARATION

Please wear clothing that is comfortable and loose fitting, especially on days when we'll be doing floor work. Come to class focused and ready to work. Evaluations will be made on all exercises, etc.

Your final book should be organized by subjects and contain a table of contents.

Show Survey: For each of the department's productions this semester, you will submit a response using the Show Survey found under course documents on Blackboard. On your survey, you should fully respond to each of the voice and speech questions. Surveys are due at the beginning of class the Wednesday following the show's closing.

Journal Entries: Each student will keep a journal throughout the semester. You are to bring this journal with you to each class. Entries will be made regularly during and following class work. Journals will be checked toward the end of the semester for content and participation.

Assessment Assignments: Students will be asked to practice and perform various voice assignments for analysis. Assessments will be scheduled during class.

Monologue: Each student will be required to choose a serious contemporary monologue that will be worked throughout the semester. If you already have a contemporary monologue in your current audition repertoire, you may use that one. Otherwise, you will need to find one.
