Course Description: This course utilizes the application of the social science mode of inquiry to the study of the sociocultural characteristics of sport. These include examinations of the cultural, economic, political and structural factors (i.e., gender, race, etc.) which form salient aspects of today's sport activities at various levels. Focus is placed on the characteristics of sports and how these characteristics both reflect and have impact upon the social climate of a given society.

Student Learning Objectives: By the end of the course, students should be able to:

- analyze the topic of sport from a sociological perspective
- apply key sociological theories to current news events and everyday life
- engage in reflective practice regarding individual sport participation, experiences, and decisions
- understand the historical development of sport and its place within contemporary society
 - identify how sexual orientation, disability, race, social class, age and gender are intertwined with current understandings of sport
 - assess how meanings are constructed, reconstructed, and attached to sport participation and the culture of sport
 - demonstrate an understanding of the key critical debates in defining sport in society

Required Text *The Sociology of Sports* (2nd Edition) by Tim Delaney and Tim Madigan
(ISBN:9780786497676)

Attendance: This is an online course so the usual attendance policies are not applicable. Students are expected to regularly check in to Blackboard to keep up with all assignments, discussions, emails, etc. **Documentation is still required** for missed work to be excused, and to make up missed assignments, quizzes or exams.

Exams: there will be three equally weighted exams. These will consist of multiple-choice and true/false questions. On exam day, you must bring a scantron to take the test. Each exam will be worth 100 points (3 x 100 = 300). All exam grades will factor into your final grade.

The exams will cover the assigned chapters in the textbook AND the material discussed in class. Although much of the class lectures will refer to the text, new material will also be introduced. You are expected to read and study the textbook independently. Information discussed in class, as well as that contained in the assigned readings, even if they are not reviewed in class, may appear on exams.

Make-up exams will be given only if arranged with the professor **PRIOR** to the day of the scheduled exam to be missed and **ONLY** if the reason for the absence is deemed valid by the professor. Documentation for absences must be provided to make-up assignments, quizzes or exams.

In addition to the exams there will be a weekly assignment on the topics covered in class. Class assignments consist of a variety of quizzes, discussions, and responses to articles. Late assignments will not be accepted and they cannot be made up due to unexcused absences. These assignments should be critically thought out and analysis based responses. There will be approximately 10-15 weekly assignments which will be worth a total of 100 points. **NO E-MAIL SUBMISSIONS WILL BE ACCEPTED. No ASSIGNMENT IS ACCEPTED WITHOUT AN EXCUSE APPROVED ACCORDING TO SHSU POLICY. HARD COPIES SUBMITTED IN CLASS IS THE ONLY METHOD I WILL ACCEPT.**

In addition to the exams, there may be multiple opportunities to receive extra credit in the course. These points will count toward the final grade.

Final grades will be calculated by adding points earned from three administered exams, discussions, weekly reflections, and any extra credit points earned. The grades will be weighted as follows:

Exams (3): 100 points each=300

Assignments/Quizzes (15): 5 to 10 points each =100

Total: 400 points

The grade scale should go as follows, (360 points or higher= A, 320-359 points= B, 280-319 points =C,240-279 points= D, and 239 or lower is a grade of F. If your final average is within two points of a higher letter grade and you have no more than two absences, your grade will be rounded up. If you do not meet both of these requirements, your grade will remain as is.
