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Course Description

This is a skills based course that gives students experience in using the computer to create visual documentation in the design process. Subject areas include: set renderings, costume renderings, painters elevations; and scenic models 3 credit hours

Course Description (cont'd)

Students will examine applications of theatrical design techniques through digital media. This will consist of a studio-based overview of 3D rendering, pre-visualization, and use of digital imagery.

You are held responsible for any handouts given during the semester. This includes but is not limited to PowerPoints on blackboard, project descriptions and rubrics, and other documents provided electronically or printed.
