Course Description

Advanced design. Students will be involved in creating scenic, lighting, and sound design projects. The course will include extensive sketching, rendering, computer drafting, and model building. 3 credit hours

Course Description (cont'd)

This course will focus on the design style found most often Your grade will be based on a composite of projects, quizzes, tests, and attendance.

You are held responsible for any handouts given during the semester. This includes but is not limited to PowerPoints on blackboard, project descriptions and rubrics, and other documents provided electronically or printed.

Course Objectives (as taken from the NAST standards and competencies)

- The ability to think, speak, and write clearly and effectively.

- Ability to understand and articulate basic elements and principles of design theory.
- Ability to understand and articulate basic elements and principles of composition related to line, shape, color, texture, and sound.
- Understanding of the aesthetic use of color.

- Ability to communicate design ideas and realities to other personnel involved in the production, including directors, other designers, stage managers, and actors.
- Ability to produce and communicate design ideas with freehand drawings.
- Ability to provide formalized, accurate production models and drawings by hand and/or through the use of current industry standard software programs.

For that reason, make up sessions will not be scheduled unless there is a valid excuse as **determined by the instructor**. PLEASE NOTE: NO DISTINCTION WILL BE DRAWN BETWEEN EXCUSED AND UNEXCUSED ABSENCES. An absence is an absence. Please realize that it is better to contact the instructor, **ahead of time**, than to just not be in class. This may be through email or by phone. More than three absences, cumulatively throughout the semester, will result in your **FINAL** grade being lowered a full letter for every absence over the permitted threshold. In this section each tardy, defined as arriving after the sketch assignment for the day has been set out, counts as ½ of an absence.
