COURSE DESCRIPTION AND GOALS

This course will provide you with an overview of basic single and multi-camera video production. Labs will examine production, writing and performance concepts and applications. Lab assignments will offer you the opportunity to develop and produce productions that utilize various writing and technical proficiencies.

This course will be composed of four modules:

1) Short Form Media:

Learn the basics of video production, from composing shots, to using equipment. Produce a PSA only using Close Ups. Make a short film using the continuity technique. Learn how to edit using professional editing software.

2) Studio and Field Equipment Orientation and Production Workflow:

An overview of BASIC essentials and positions in multi-camera television studio production. Introduction the basics of the studio production, control room operation, including use of the switcher, audio board, and graphics creator. Introduction to lighting, camera, audio, and set operation. Gain the fundamental tools and protocols to produce and work as a crew member.

3) News Package:

Write, shoot, edit and produce a 1-2 minute voice over broadcast news story.

4) Portfolio/Website Media Management:

Creation of basic website portfolio. Basic layout and digital media content management.

IDEA OBJECTIVES

- Gaining factual knowledge (terminology, classifications, methods, trends)
- Developing specific skills, competencies, and points of view needed by professionals in the field most closely related to this course.
- Acquiring skills in working with others as a member of a team.

REQUIRED MATERIALS

You are required to have an EXTERNAL HARD DRIVE (formatted for Apple Computers) with at least 500GB of memory and preferably with a USB 3.0 connection. You must bring your hard drive to all classes, no exception! Sharing hard drives or saving your assignments in the school computers or server is not allowed. It is highly recommended that you backup your project files on a separate flash drive after quitting each edit session to avoid the loss of your edited work in case your hard drive crashes. You are also required to have an SDHC (CLASS 6 or higher) MEMORY CARD (min. 8GB) and HEADPHONES or EARBUDS.

ATTENDANCE

Your participation is important. You are allowed THREE unexcused absences. Every absence after that will cause you to lose 5 points of your Attendance grade.

ASSIGNMENTS AND GRADING

All written assignments must be typed and handed in during class, unless otherwise indicated by instructor. Late assignments result in loss of points. If you have to miss a class when an assignment is due, have another student turn it in for you, or hand it in ahead of time. Please keep track of your own progress in the class. Keep all of your handed back assignments. Late assignments are docked one full letter grade per day. An "F" is equal to "0" points. For several of the production assignments you have to be in class and on time. If you miss any of those, you will receive zero points, unless you have a documented excuse (doctor's note, for example).
