#### **COURSE DESCRIPTION**

This is an introductory course designed to familiarize you with the facets of the criminal justice system, the sub-systems and how they interrelate, processing of offenders, punishment and its alternatives, and the future of the criminal justice system.

This class will make extensive use of Blackboard to facilitate learning and communication. Lecture materials and links to resources will be posted on the class site. You are expected to take personal initiative in self-assessing your understanding of course material by taking learning checks that are available on the class site. In addition, discussion assignments will be given across the semester that will require you to read and post material to the discussion board.

There will be an exam with each assigned chapter. The exams consist of items drawn at random from the test bank. The exam can be taken at any time up to two weeks from the first day the chapter is assigned.

Frequent and regular activity in this class will be essential for successful completion.

#### **Course Policies**
