REPORTING ELDER ABUSE

Call the police or 9-1-1 immediately if you are aware of an elder who is in immediate, life-threatening danger.

If you suspect abuse, neglect or exploitation, you should report it. Most states require those in the helping professions to report suspected abuse. In 8 states [including **Texas**], **ANY person suspecting abuse is obliged to report it.**

Also, you can reach the Eldercare Locator by telephone at **1-800-677-1116**. Specially trained operators will refer you to a local agency that can help. The Eldercare Locator is open Monday through Friday, 9 a.m. to 8 p.m. Eastern Time.

Course Description

This course offers graduate students a combination of a broad-based study of the social, physical and psychological dynamics of aging, coupled with an advanced understanding of elder abuse, neglect and exploitation. This includes the incidence and prevalence of these crimes as well as prevailing theoretical perspectives related to causality. Particular attention will also be paid to inter-professional collaborations in response to these offenses, as well as elder abuse and the law. The course will also explore long-range trends in aging in the U.S. and initiatives to protect the population's eldest members.

COURSE OBJECTIVES

At the completion of this course, students will be able to:

- ✓ Summarize the major social, biological and psychological changes associated with aging;
- ✓ List the major physical and mental indicators of different types of elder abuse, neglect and exploitation of older persons;
- ✓ Describe and give examples of the major explanations for elder crime victimization;
- ✓ Demonstrate mastery of course material by completing a field-based Academic Community Engagement (ACE) Project; and
- ✓ Make specific recommendations for at least two strategic initiatives to improve services and remedies for elder crime victims.

ACADEMIC COMMUNITY ENGAGEMENT PROJECTS

This Academic Community Engagement (ACE) project is especially designed to foster civic engagement. In this course, students will not only become familiar with the theories, skills and content in *Elder Crime Victimization* but will use this knowledge to propose improvements in the quality of life for elders in your community, directly or through agencies that serve senior adults.

It is estimated that you will spend 9-10 hours of your time this semester on this term project related to aging and/or elder abuse. Each of you will: (1) select an agency, organization or at least three senior adults in your community, (2) determine a problem or program need that they or their elder client constituents could use assistance with, (3) develop a proposed remedy for the problem, (4) deliver this program or remedy, (5) solicit their feedback on the effectiveness of your intervention, (6) write up this ACE project in the form of a report, (7) share it with your classmates and (8) receive peer comments about the project.
