Course Description: Relativity is introduced, quantum theory of light, Compton effect, photoelectric effect, Bohr atom, particles as waves, quantum mechanics in one dimension, tunneling, and atomic structure are covered. Prerequisites: minimum grade of C in Math2440 and PHYS1422. PHYS3111 must be taken concurrently.

Course Objective: This course is to provide an introduction to the principles and mathematical implementation of two revolutionary developments of the 20th Century – Relativity and Quantum Mechanics. Upon completion of this course, the student will be able to apply a basic understanding of the concepts of modern physics to solve quantitative problems in relativity and quantum mechanics.

Required Textbook: Modern Physics for Scientists and Engineers, 4th Edition by Thornton and Rex, Cengage Learning.

Required Supplies: Pencil, pen, engineering paper, a calculator, eraser...

Optional Texts: None

Attendance Policy:	Class will start and end at the assigned times. No one will be permitted to leave the classroom after class has started. Please see the university catalogue for institution expectation regarding class attendance. No make-up exams will be given unless written justification from a physician is provided. Make-up exams will be given to students in compliance with the Religious Holy Days policy given below.
Assignments:	Homework assignments will be given, and will be graded.
Exams:	Two major examinations will be given during the semester. At the end of the semester, a comprehensive final examination will be given.
Grading Plan:	Major exams will count 25% of your term average with the final exam providing 30%. Homework assignments will count 20%.
Academic Dishonesty:	All students are expected to engage in all academic pursuits in a manner that is above reproach. Students are expected to maintain complete honesty and integrity in the academic experiences both in and out of the classroom. Any student found guilty of dishonesty in any phase of academic work will be subject to disciplinary action. The University and its official representatives may initiate disciplinary proceedings against a student accused of any form of academic dishonesty including, but not limited to, cheating on an examination or other academic work which is to be submitted, plagiarism, collusion and the abuse of resource materials.
Classroom Rules of Conduct:	Students will refrain from behavior in the classroom that intentionally or unintentionally disrupts the learning process and, thus, impedes the mission of the university. Cellular telephones and pagers must be turned off before class begins. Students are prohibited from eating in class, using tobacco products, making offensive remarks, reading newspapers, sleeping, talking at inappropriate times, wearing inappropriate clothing, or engaging in any other form of distraction. Inappropriate behavior in the classroom shall result in a directive to leave class. Students who are especially disruptive also may be reported to the Dean of Students for disciplinary action in accordance with university policy.
Visitors in the Classroom:	Unannounced visitors to class must present a current, official SHSU identification card to be permitted in the classroom. They must not present a disruption to the class by their attendance. If the visitor is

not a registered student, it is at the instructor's discretion whether the visitor will be allowed to remain in the classroom.

Course Outline: The course will cover chapters 1 through 10 in the text. This may be altered at the discretion of the instructor.

University policy 861001 provides the procedures to be followed by the student and instructor. A student desiring to absent himself/herself from a scheduled class in order to observe (a) religious holy day(s) shall present to each instructor involved a written statement concerning the religious holy day(s). This request must be made in the first fifteen days of the semester or the first seven days of a summer session in which the absence(s) will occur. The instructor will complete a form notifying the student of a reasonable timeframe in which the missed assignments and/or examinations are to be completed.
