#### **3 CREDIT HOURS**

**Course Description:** This course is a continuation of SPAN 1412 with special emphasis on practical needs for communication. Intermediate-level readings and audiovisual materials (e.g., film, television, videos) are incorporated into the course. A grade of C or better in SPAN 1412 is required to enroll in this course.

**STYLE** This course combines in-class meetings with online assignments. Through Blackboard you will access McGraw-Hill Education Connect® to complete assignments that come with your textbook access code. Since **practice** is what makes you able to use your language proficiently in a variety of contexts, Connect® is organized for you to first study the materials provided, then practice the skill/knowledge, and then assess what you've learned. Assignments should be accessed through Blackboard to ensure that they sync properly to the gradebook.

Because language learning requires *REGULAR* practice, assignments are due each week. Pay attention to these dates so you don't fall behind. You are responsible for completing your work on time to earn full credit. Late work is penalized. Unit progress checks and exams are not accepted late.

## **CONNECT ONLINE LAB (26%)**

Complete the assigned activities concurrently with the course calendar/schedule, access it in the schedule section of this syllabus or in Blackboard/CONNECT calendars. You can resubmit your assignments to improve your grade (up to 3 times). You will receive the points earned on your BEST attempt (out of three possible

attempts) for that activity. Late submissions are reduced by 10% per day late. Connect activities should be accessed through Blackboard in order to sync your progress and save the grades. The lab activities prepare you for the quizzes and written and oral projects. Skipping practice is a terrible idea.

This course is paired with Blackboard so you don't need a course URL. Simply click on your first Connect assignment in Blackboard to get to the course registration page. After registering, you will automatically be directed to Connect from the Blackboard page. Always begin your assignments through Blackboard to sync your grade. If you log in to Connect separately from Blackboard, don't forget to click on the assignment in Blackboard after completion to sync your grades.

You have only one chance and a limited time to submit your questions. Late submissions are reduced by 20% per day late.

Each lesson in Blackboard requires you to study the materials and then complete short Blackboard assignments for you to practice vocabulary and grammar. **Late assignments will not be accepted**. Exceptions for well-documented reasons will be given at the instructor's discretion. Find instructions in Blackboard.

# 4 BLACKBOARD WRITING PROJECTS (3% each)

There will be writing projects for each chapter. All writing assignments should have the corresponding heading and should be turned in by the due date (see course calendar schedule). Find instructions in Blackboard. Late assignments will not be accepted

#### **BLACKBOARD ORAL PROJECTS (12%)**

There will be oral grades for each chapter. Oral grades assess the student's pronunciation/intonation, fluency, and use of grammar and vocabulary. Each chapter the instruction will provide options for interviews, presentations, or role-plays. Find instructions in Blackboard. **Late assignments will not be accepted.** 

#### 2 ATTENDANCE/PARTICIPATION (3% each):

Attendance and active participation is required in class and online. In class, participation is assessed by students' ability to participate. Students should complete the assigned CONNECT lab practice before class to be ready to participate. Students will submit a self-assessment of the class participation on Blackboard. Guidelines will be given. Students should log examples of class participation to use as evidence in their self-assessment. Attendance is assessed by Blackboard activity in online courses.

Attendance and participation are crucial to developing oral/aural language skills. You may miss **ONE** (1) class without penalty. Any additional missed classes, regardless of the reason, will result in a 2% penalty on your **FINAL COURSE GRADE**. Arriving more than 15 minutes after class begins or leaving early will result in being marked tardy. Three tardies constitute an absence. Please arrange your schedule so that you can attend each class for the full scheduled time. Students are encouraged to "buddy" with other students **to get class notes/assignments.** 

As part of your participation grade, there will be field trips or cultural activities announced in Blackboard. You need to make sure you attend at least two of these opportunities, one for each participation self-assessment. At the beginning of the course, check dates and make sure to block those dates in your calendar for this requirement for your final grade.

#### Final exam (4%)

Students will choose one of the culture topics studied during the course and present about it in a short video presentation. Script must be between 10 and 15 simple sentences. Content, vocabulary, grammar, pronunciation, and delivery (not reading) will be assessed.

**Extra credit** (at instructor's approval—max. 6 points): Extra cultural activities, tutoring meetings, and participation with the Spanish Conversation Club. Email at least 48 hours prior to your professor to be given approval. Approval is decided upon your overall progress in the course and the skills you need to develop for your progress in this level of Spanish.



Section 51.911 (a) (2) defines a religious holy day as: "a holy day observed by a religion whose places of worship are exempt from property taxation under Section 11.20...." A student whose absence is excused under this subsection may not be penalized for that absence and shall be allowed to take an examination or complete an assignment from which the student is excused within a reasonable time after the absence.

University policy 861001 provides the procedures to be followed by the student and instructor. A student desiring to absent himself/herself from a scheduled class in order to observe (a) religious holy day(s) shall present to each instructor involved a written statement concerning the religious holy day(s). #### **PHILOSOPHY**

**ATTENDANCE IS REQUIRED** for lecture sessions. If you are absent without making arrangements with the professor, with or without justification, your grade will be affected. Students are encouraged to "buddy" with other students to get class notes/assignments. Always refer to your syllabus on Blackboard. It is the student's responsibility to request and turn in make-up work, which normally must be completed within one week after returning.
