COURSE DESCRIPTION AND OBJECTIVES:

<u>COURSE DESCRIPTION AND OBJECTIVES</u>: The purpose of this course is to introduce graduate students to the major authors of the Restoration and Early 18th Century. This will be achieved by required readings, lectures, and class discussion. Tests will include essay and objective components.
