COURSE OBJECTIVE: This course will closely examine the major figures in English literature from 1798 to the present. The purpose of this class is to offer you the opportunity to read, analyze, and discuss a representative selection of English literature from the Romantics to the present, with particular attention to the relationship of the literature to its social, political, and intellectual contexts. This class will provide the foundation you will need for further analysis of both canonical and non-canonical literature. Most importantly, I hope to stimulate a love for and an appreciation of good literature.

REQUIREMENTS FOR THE COURSE:

<u>Reading Journal</u>—The Reading Journal provides you with the opportunity to respond informally to the literary texts we are reading. I will provide specific prompts for each entry. You will complete these on Blackboard. Please use MLA citations when citing material. All entries should be at least one page in length double-spaced with normal MLA margins and font. All entries will be graded on the thoroughness, perceptiveness, and specificity of your response.

<u>Midterm and Final</u>—You will take two exams, which will consist of an in-class essay and an objective short-answer section.

<u>Paper</u>—You will write a five-page paper (typed, double-spaced, 1-inch margins). This paper should offer a detailed analysis of a single work or a comparison/contrast of two or more works.

<u>Presentation</u>—You will be placed in a group to present on *A Passage to India*. Details on the presentations will be given to you at a later date.
