Course Description

The Study of Human Disease is an introduction to the relationship between the human body and disease, both communicable and non-communicable. The course will include the historical aspects of various diseases, etiology, prevention, control, prevalence, symptoms, and treatment. This course will prepare students with the knowledge, skills, core values, and professional dispositions they will need to work in one of the diverse areas of population health.

You will gain the necessary cognitive information through readings, media, discussion, lecture, and activities. Throughout the course, students will have opportunity to analyze their own attitudes and behaviors. Additionally, the course will allow you opportunity to analyze and discuss prominent societal and policy issues. Much of our class time will be spent practicing skills and discussing topics not in your reading. For these reasons, it is important that you be in class.

 - a. Locate and utilize (engage in) resources, services, and activities/events to familiarize yourself with the prevention and treatment of human diseases

EXAMS

To test your knowledge and understanding of the information covered in class, you will be given three exams. Each exam may consist of multiple choice, true or false, matching, fill-in-the-blank and/or short answer questions. There are 150 possible points on each exam (450/1000 points).

QUIZZES

At the end of each chapter discussed, a quiz will be given on the information presented in class. These quizzes will help prepare you for upcoming exams. We will go over 13 chapters this semester. Each quiz will be worth 10 points (130/1000 points).

PRESENTATION

Each student will present on a different disease (disease determined on the first day of class). Basic information such as cause of disease, prevalence, signs, symptoms, ways to diagnose, prognosis, treatment, and prevention should be included in the presentation. A visual for the class to see and a handout for each person is also required. The presentation schedule will be posted after the first class day. This presentation is worth 150 points (150/1000 points).

DISCUSSION HOMEWORK

Public health, in terms of disease, is both interesting and debatable. The factors that determine whether there is or isn't a disease is simple; however, topics pertaining to disease can be debatable. Each week, a discussion question will be posted on Blackboard. A one page, double-spaced response will be due at the beginning of the next class. Twenty to thirty minutes of the next class will be spent discussing and/or debating the topic. There will be 10 discussion prompts worth 20 points each (200/1000 points).

PARTICIPATION

Despite the lecture format of the course, class will entail a large amount of participation. The rationale being that a large amount of information that is learned about health and disease involves hearing different perspectives and opinions from others on disease-related issues. Participation will be graded by attentiveness and speaking in class discussions, contributing in classmates' presentations, and overall class attendance. Take note that since class attendance factors into your participation points, unexcused absences may culminate in a notable drop in your final grade. Participation is worth 7% of your overall grade (70/1000 points).

STUDENT ABSENCES ON RELIGIOUS HOLY DAYS POLICY

Section 51.911(b) of the Texas Education Code requires that an institution of higher education excuse a student from attending classes or other required activities, including examinations, for the observance of a religious holy day, including travel for that purpose. A student whose absence is excused under this subsection may not be penalized for that absence and shall be allowed to take an examination or complete an assignment from which the student is excused within a reasonable time after the absence.

University policy 861001 provides the procedures to be followed by the student and instructor. A student desiring to absent himself/herself from a scheduled class in order to observe (a) religious holy day(s) shall present to each instructor involved a written statement concerning the religious holy day(s). This request must be made in the first fifteen days of the semester or the first seven days of a summer session in which the absence(s) will occur. The instructor will complete a form notifying the student of a reasonable timeframe in which the missed assignments and/or examinations are to be completed.
