The content of the course features a study of the research and theory of strategic learning, cognition, and motivation. Students use assessment instruments to identify their own strengths and weaknesses as strategic learners. Students will research, think critically, write, and present on various topics to develop the skills necessary to excel in coursework. Students are expected to apply the learning skills discussed across their own academic programs and

become effective and efficient learners. As a result of this course, students will have the tools necessary to engage in increasingly complex academic endeavors, civic responsibility, marketable skills development, and career planning.


Learning Outcomes



Writing Enhanced Course

All written assignments turned in to the instructor must be typed, double-spaced, in either Times New Roman or Arial font style and 12 pt. font size, using correct grammar, sentence structure, citations, references, and terminology. When doing the research pieces, make sure that all sources are cited correctly using MLA or APA format (6th edition) as directed by your instructor.



Writing Assignment Details (50% or 500 points total)

Success Portfolio Parts I – IV Overview

A major research project for UNIV 1301 this semester is entitled "Success Portfolio". This four-part project will consist of separate but related visual, aural, oral, and research/writing assignments and will serve as an exploration of your college experience and your career plans. As you discover resources and develop strategies to apply skills in course lessons, think of this project as a roadmap for the future.

These assignments can include ideas from guest speakers, from topic presentations and debates, from independent library research, and from many of the assignments that we will do in class or as homework. Therefore, it is critical for you to attend every class period (in all of your classes) and complete all of the in-class and homework assignments thoroughly and on time. You will need them as references and sources for your work.

Please note that the Success Portfolio Part II: Career Exploration Research Paper assignment requires you to make at least one appointment with the SHSU Academic Success Center (writing support services) to review and improve your writing. At the writing session the tutor will help you organize your thoughts about the topic and review your draft to make suggestions on how you might improve the writing of the paper. I suggest you also make an individual appointment with your Career Counselor, Mr. Benjamin Cantu. Please schedule these appointments well in advance of the due dates. Do not wait until the last minute because these resources will be booked and you will not be able to complete this portion of the assignment.

They are both powerful resources that you will use throughout your college experience. When you turn in the final copy of your research paper, you will also include the last draft that you took to the Writing Center. The draft should include the Writing Center stamp along with the notations of the suggestions that they make for the paper. Part of your final grade will come from whether or not you revised your papers based on their suggestions.

Written assignments must to typed, double spaced, 12 point Times New Roman font, 1" top and bottom margins and 1" side margins (Marked as 'Normal' under 'Margins' in Word). Additionally, you will cite sources used on an additional page labeled "References" We will work together to cite sources correctly in MLA format or APA format. You can find resources to help you cite correctly at the Newton Gresham library website, or your Bedford Reader from your ENGL 1301 or ENGL 1302 course.

We will spend time defining plagiarism and applying good writing practices to avoid it. Assignments received that are not correctly cited or are obviously copied from another place, or otherwise suspected of plagiarism may receive no credit. If you have any questions about how to do this that have not been answered by those resources provided above or our time in class, please feel free to ask me before turning in your paper and I would be happy to assist you.

Success Portfolio Part I: College Plan (100 pts.)

During the class we will apply goal setting, time management, learning and personality styles, active learning, critical thinking, academic integrity, and study skills to your college coursework. Think about how you might use information from your SAM center advisor, your Newton Gresham Librarian, your Career Services Counselor, your textbook, and from other campus resources we may discuss and that you might additionally find. You will upload your final work to a pre-designated place within Blackboard. Below are expectations for content and organization.

- a. Create a Digital SMART Goals action plan (see examples and see your textbook)
 - I. Include short-term (this college term) goals (based on all course syllabi),
 - II. long-term (one to four years) goals
 - III. What actions will you take, or have you taken so far, to achieve the goals. (50 pts)
- b. **Construct your individual college course plan** by semester for your undergraduate studies (see your Degree Works profile and the most recent online undergraduate catalog). You will be able to complete

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this assignment more successfully after our in-class Academic Advisor presentation & then your personal advisor session for spring 2017 semester advisement. You may use the course plan template provided in Blackboard. (25 pts)

c. Success Plan in Pictures (Group Project): Create a visual (pictures or artwork) and aural (music and/or narration) online promotional media piece that highlights the academic, social, financial, health, cultural, counselling, etc. services that SHSU students can use as problem-solving strategies for success in the college culture. (25 pts)

Success Portfolio Part II: Career Exploration Research Paper (150 pts.)

You may want to make an individual appointment with your assigned career services counselor (Benjamin Cantu) to get information and resources for this assignment. Other resources you may want to consult are: The Career Services website, O*Net, The Bureau of Labor Statistics, the Newton Gresham librarian assigned to our courses (Cole Williamson), and the library website:

You will upload your final work to a pre-designated place within Blackboard. Below are expectations for content and organization.

- a. Introduction (statement of purpose) and an overview of your favorite career related to your degree. (20 pts.)
- b. Details of career choice (30)
 - I. Job outlook and salary ranges
 - II. Skills and education
 - III. Advantage & disadvantages of positions (i.e. travel, flexibility, relocate, work from home)
- c. Explain why you think it is the most appropriate career path for you. Use the information from your EI, MBTI, and SSI assessments and other resources to justify why you chose this career. (30 pts.)
- d. Prepare to apply for your job by completing the following items:
 - i. A letter of interest (cover letter) in the job (See Career Services for samples) (20 pts)
 - ii. Develop a resume and include the three real references you could solicit for the job application (See Career Services website for examples http://www.shsu.edu/dept/career-ervices/students/ResumesandCoverLetters.html) (20 pts)
- e. Summary Provide a summation of your exploration. (10 pts)
- f. Writing Center draft and corrections in your final paper (10 pts)
- g. All sentences are well constructed with very few minor mistakes. Complex sentence structures are used effectively. (10 pts.)

Success Portfolio IV: The Good Food Revolution Freshman Essay (150 pts.)

Students eligible: All first-time freshmen who enroll full-time (minimum 12 hours) at Sam Houston State University in the fall 2017 semester who have read the book.

Prompt: Planned happenstance (Krumboltz, 2009; Mitchell et al., 1999) is a learning theory of how chance events often play a role in shaping a person's career and life. Using concrete (cited) examples from *The Good Food Revolution* discuss how Will Allen's career and life are good examples of this concept of planned happenstance. Write about lessons from his story that can help prepare students for life and work in the 21st century as they relate to planned happenstance.

Prize: \$500 scholarship.

OR complete: Two Short Essays, plus email request for recommendations from three people relevant to your scholarship. Apply online at Scholarships 4 Kats.

Reflection and Writing Assignments (50 points)

Students will write three (3) reflection assignments over the text book and common reader book. Students will be given a prompt for each reflection assignment (10 points each). There will be two (2) writing assignments related to the start and end of your first semester (10 points each). Students will be given a prompt for the writing assignment. Both the reflection and writing assignments will be graded on MLA or APA format, content of material, proper citation, and appropriate reflection on the material that was covered.

Class Participation Assignment Details (20% - 300 pts)

EI, MBTI, and SII assessments will reveal your emotional intelligence, personality style, your strengths, and various career opportunities, and the alignment between these and your current goals and objectives. The instructions to these online assessments are included in Blackboard under the Quick Reference tab. You will include results of this information in one or two of the "Success Portfolio" assignments (25 pts).

In-class Individual and Group Presentations: Each student will be part of collaborative teams responsible for presentations on (textbook chapters and *The Good Food Revolution*) topics (15 minutes each -75 points). These topics will be aligned with written assignments to assist you in your research and writing.

You will also be presenting your portfolio work at the end of the semester (50 pts).

Rubrics outlining expectations are provided in this syllabus. You must be in class on the day you are scheduled to present to get credit for these assignments.

Students will also be responsible for presenting one (1) journal article in class that you will be assigned to research covering three different topics; first-generation college students, first-year experience in higher education, and persistence in higher education (50 points).

Reading Quizzes: Quiz dates are outlined in the syllabus. You will take these using your MindTap login. (70 pts)

How to be a Successful Online Student (30 pts)

Missed classes (after the first three) (-100 pts. each). Please attend every class to maximize success.

Service Learning Project Details: (5% - 100 pts)

Being a good citizen means making time to help others. We will spend some time thinking about our Huntsville community and the culture of community engagement. Each member of the class is responsible for a minimum of nine (5) hours of volunteer work during our designated service learning project and for writing a reflection on the experience. We will discuss our designated project as a class and 5% of your grade will be based on this assignment. (100 pts.)

Reflection components:

- Provide background information about the mission and activities of the organization you served.
- What did you learn from the experience? Did you learn anything that you were not expecting?
- Did you learn anything that might help you in your career or your professional development?
- Do you believe you will continue to volunteer at this site? Or perhaps another site?
- Describe a 'critical incident' that created a dilemma for you because you didn't know how to act or what to say.
 - o What was confusing to you about the incident?
 - o How did you, or others around you feel about it?
 - o What did you do, or what was the first thing you thought about doing?
 - o List three actions that you might have taken and evaluate each one.
- Provide a summary that explains how our university motto" The Measure of a Life it it's Service" relates to this project and to your life.
