Course Description

This is a survey course designed to introduce the students to the domain of health care quality and safety. The course covers the entire body of knowledge in the health care quality and safety domain and is designed to be taken during a student's first year in the program. Prerequisites: Graduate standing. Credit 3 hours.

RATIONALE: This course will examine a variety of techniques to identify, measure, and improve quality and productivity in health service organizations. A range of practical issues related to quality management will also be considered, including teamwork, leadership, and the role of information technology in the support of quality initiatives. Topics include historic and contemporary view of quality (including 6-sigma, lean, and quality-based purchasing), statistical quality improvement tools and methods, and process flow and design. The intent is to provide students with insights into how quality and utilization programs are administered in fact as well as theory.

You will gain the necessary cognitive information through readings, media, discussion, lecture, and activities. Throughout the course, students will have opportunity to analyze their own attitudes and behaviors. Additionally, the course will allow you opportunity to analyze and discuss prominent societal and policy issues. Much of our course time will be spent practicing skills and discussing topics beyond your required textbook reading. For these reasons, it is important that you access the online modules in a timely manner. Once the course begins, we will have weekly sessions, assignments, and quizzes; therefore, to get the most from the course, you must keep up with your readings and assignments.

- 3. Analyze health organization performance using different quality and safety measures and tools,
- 4. Organize and employ performance tools to change organizational processes to improve quality and safety outcomes,
- 5. Explain the importance of process in the management of quality systems in health organizations.
- 6. Identify key external health organization quality evaluation systems, and
- 7. Assess appropriate performance and safety measures for health organizations.

PROFESSIONAL DEVELOPMENT:

Upon completion of this course, students are strongly encouraged to test their understanding of the course material by taking Quality Improvement Associate Certification examination offered by the American Society for Quality (www.asq.org). Detail on this examination is available through our course Blackboard shell. Additionally, the Certified Professional in Healthcare Quality (CPHQ) is a credential that signifies professional and academic achievement by individuals in the field of healthcare quality management (http://www.nahq.org/certify/content/index.html).

For students, the Quality Improvement Associate Certification and the Certified Professional in Healthcare Quality examination have two benefits: 1) it provides an independent assessment of their understanding of the course material and 2) it provides an additional and important credential (i.e., Certified Quality Improvement Associate or CPHQ).

When citing an author, use either the APA style (Brown, 2014) or the AMA style (superscript number¹) immediately after the statement. Then, in the Endnotes give the entire reference: 1. Brown, S (2014). Best article. Journal of Cool Stuff; 4(2), p.3-7. This is your warning; if you borrow without giving credit you will get zero points for the parts borrowed. If you are working on an assignment that requires all your own work (or an exam), you should not be citing other authors anyway.
