Course Description:

This is an introductory course on the role and function of the police in the criminal justice system and the broader society. Emphasis is placed on the development of policing and the roles of the police in contemporary America. Course content will emphasize issues and conflicts inherent in policing a democratic society. As a survey course, it examines the history of the police and the social values and value conflicts that underlay contemporary law enforcement. Moreover, the course includes an examination of important issues and topics.

Upon successful completion of this course, the student will be familiar with both the practical and philosophical components of the American police force.

Objectives:

This course has three primary objectives:

- Learn fundamental principles and theories of American police,
- Gain the factual knowledge of the operations and practices of the police, and
- Know the impact of the importance of external environment on the police.

Reading Assignments: Each student is expected to have completed the reading assignments before each class session. Reading the assignments before each class session will enhance the student's understanding of the lectures.

Evaluation:

Grades for this course will be comprised of three exams (300 points) and the completion of 10 assignments and posted in the discussion section (10 points each assignment with a total of 100 points). The assignment must be submitted by 11:59:00pm (Central Time) on Wednesdays. Students are not required to participate in the discussion group but strongly encouraged to share your thoughts with your peers or ask questions about how to work on the assignments. When submitting the assignments in the discussion group section, you are able to read the assignments of other students.

Exams cover both reading assignments and lecture material. Exams consist of 50 multiple choice questions (2 points each). This is an open-book exam, and the time of the first two exams is limited to 75 minutes and the time of the final exam is 90 minutes. The final exam is not comprehensive. The assignment is based on the weekly topic and usually involved with a web search of an issue in policing or an essay after watching a video. If you need additional help in the completion of the assignment, you can either send an email to me or my teaching assistant. At the same time, you can post your question on the discussion board so other students are able to share their thoughts with you. Students may be assigned into several groups, depending on the number of enrollment in the class.
