COURSE DESCRIPTION AND OBJECTIVES

MUSI 1310 is a survey of the history of rock and popular music beginning with their common origins in 19th-century popular and southern folk music, and continuing through the latest trends with discussions that include individual musicians as well as stylistic details. [Prerequisites: *none*]

The course provides students with the tools for understanding the interaction of music and civilization from a historical perspective with references to the visual arts, history, and popular trends as they relate to the development of the style of music known as "Rock and Roll."

ASSIGNMENTS

Students will be responsible for reading 30 chapters take 29 quizzes by the end of the semester.

There are many FURTHER EXPLORATION short answer questions. **Choose only 10** to answer throughout the semester which interest you most. These are tweet-length comments and must be completed by the end of the semester.

There is ONE STUDENT BLOG that you will contribute 1-2 paragraphs of input at ANY TIME throughout the semester. Must be completed by the end of the semester

QUIZZES

ALL quizzes will be administered online on Kendall Hunt *ROCK ON!* course website. Each quiz will be available to you from the first day of class. The REQUIRED completion date is December 8, 2017, the end of the semester. There are **NO MAKEUPS for exams – NO exceptions**.

You are allowed **two (2) attempts at each exam** –the <u>higher</u> of the two attempts will be your exam grade. To improve your grade, re-study, and review the materials. Then re-take the exam.

Section 51.911(b) of the Texas Education Code requires that an institution of higher education excuse a student from attending classes or other required activities, including examinations, for the observance of a religious holy day, including travel for that purpose. A student whose absence is excused under this subsection may not be penalized for that absence and shall be allowed to take an examination or complete an assignment from which the student is excused within a reasonable time after the absence. University policy 861001 provides the procedures to be followed by the student and instructor. A student desiring to be absent himself/herself from a scheduled class in order to observe (a) religious holy day(s) shall present to each instructor involved a written statement concerning the religious holy day(s). This request must be made in the first 15 days of the semester or the first seven days of a summer session in with the absence(s) will occur. The instructor will complete a form notifying the student of a reasonable timeframe in which the missed assignments and/or examinations are to be completed.
