PSYC 3331: ABNORMAL PSYCHOLOGY

COURSE DESCRIPTION: The course is a survey of the field of abnormal psychology. It will include the current research as well as etiology, diagnostic criteria, and a brief consideration of therapeutic approaches regarding psychological disorders.

COURSE OBJECTIVES:

- Demonstrate through test scores and weekly assignments an understanding of the general concepts of abnormal psychology.
- Have a working understanding of the theories and concepts related to abnormal psychology presented during the course through test scores and weekly assignments.

REQUIRED TEXT: ABNORMAL PSYCHOLOGY, Ninth Edition, Author: Ronald J. Comer, Publisher: Worth, ISBN: 9781464171703

EXAMS: 4 exams will be given and each will be an objective, multiple-choice format and the available time for each test will be posted on Blackboard (under the required test). The questions will be taken from the text as well as from class lectures. If a test is missed a grade of 0 will be given. If a test is missed for a legitimate emergency (illness, etc.) and the instructor is immediately notified, arrangements can be made for a makeup exam. If schedule conflicts arise, inform the instructor prior to the exam date.

WEEKLY ASSIGNMENTS: There are 15 weekly assignments (one per week) that are to be completed. Each will be scored from 0 to 3 based upon the completeness of the assignment and the demonstration of your thought process. Any assignment not received will automatically be given 0 points. These assignments will be found on Blackboard and will be completed as a link. All late assignments will be graded at the professor's discretion.

DISCUSSION BOARDS: In addition to weekly assignments, each student is expected to participate in a weekly discussion board, where a topic covered in the text will be opened for group discussion. Each post will be scored from 0 to 3 based upon the quality of contribution to discussion. While discussion may involve disagreement, students are reminded to remain respectful towards their classmates at all times. Any missed response will automatically be given 0 points. The discussion boards will be found on Blackboard and opened by the professor on Monday of each week. Discussion boards will close at midnight on Sunday of the following week.

CLASS PARTICIPATION: Up to 10 total points will be granted throughout the semester for participation in each of the weekly discussion boards, separate from the assignment grade.

GRADING PLAN: A number grade of 0 to 100 will be given for each test. The final grade will be the average of the 4 test scores and the total of the weekly assignment points, discussion board, and participation points. The grade for each test as well as the final grade (the average of the 4 test scores and the other assignments) will be determined by a 10% cut off:

90 to 100 = A 80 to 89 = B 70 to 79 = C 60 to 60 = D 59 and below = F.

The grade earned on each test as well as the final grade will be posted online within two days of the completion of the examination.
