VISUAL METHODS FOR STUDYING MORPHOLOGY AND EVOLUTION

COURSE DESCRIPTION:

This class will cover a series of visual methods and techniques to facilitate the study evolution. We will be covering several topics starting with basic visual programs (Adobe CS), Computer tomographies, geometric morphometrics and statistic packages. The course is very hands on, and we will be developing 4 modules.

CREDIT HOURS: 3

COURSE OBJECTIVES:

Module 1: Introduction the visual programs, Photoshop, Adobe Illustrator, Adobe profesional. Goal, design and produce a poster suitable for a Scientific meeting.

Module 2: CT tomographies. Learn basic of imaging processing. Link your data to morphosource and other online platforms. The whole class will work on an anatomical paper.

Module 3: R package and geomorph. We will learn basics of R to produce scientific graphs. Learn the basics of morphometric analyses. TNT module for 2D and 3D data.

Module 4: This module is optional depending on the time available, but minimally we will review recent methods to study and visualize evolution, and for comparative biology (e.g. phytools).

This request must be made in the first fifteen days of the semester or the first seven days of a summer session in which the absence(s) will occur. The instructor will complete a form notifying the student of a reasonable timeframe in which the missed assignments and/or examinations are to be completed.

CLASS ATTENDANCE

- 1. Regular and punctual class attendance is expected of each student at Sam Houston State University.
- 2. Each faculty member will keep a record of student attendance.
- 3. Each faculty member will announce the policies for accepting late work or providing makeup examinations. Students are expected to show appropriate cause for missing or delaying major assignments or examinations.
