

### **Course Description and Objectives**

This course introduces you the basic and principal methods used in the field of criminology and criminal justice. Topics that will be covered in this class are divided into four sections, including (1) the foundation for scientific inquiry in criminal justice, (2) key concepts and components of research design, (3) different types of research design and their procedures to conduct, and (4) brief introduction to data analysis and interpretation. You will be asked to apply the materials covered above to your own research proposal.

By the end of this semester, you will be expected to:

- Identify important terminologies and concepts related to research design in the field of criminology and criminal justice.
- Apply different types of research designs to different research questions.
- Distinguish well-designed research from poorly designed and unethical research.
- Efficiently find academic resource to solve research questions related to criminology and criminal justice.

### Quizzes

There will be 10 open-book quizzes. Chapter 1 to 7 and Chapter 10 will have a quiz for each chapter, but Chapter 8 and 9 will be in one quiz and Chapter 11 and 12 will be in one quiz. Each quiz is 20 points. In each quiz, there will be 10 multiple choices (1 point for each) and 2 short answer questions (5 points for each). Quizzes are due on Sunday midnight (23:59 pm) of that material's week (see schedule at the bottom in details). Each quiz only allows one attempt with force completion and you will have one hour to finish your quiz.

## **Make-up Exams**

Make-up exams for quizzes are allowed only if you provide certain document to prove you have to miss the deadline.

#### **Research Proposal**

Each student is asked to complete a research proposal on a crime or criminal justice related research topic. Your paper would include an Introduction, Literature Review, and Methods section. You also need a reference page for all the articles, books, and other sources you cite in your paper. Use APA format for the paper, in-text citations, and the reference page. You will have 5 deadlines for the research topic, introduction, literature review, methods, and the whole draft. See the schedule at the end of the syllabi for details.

- 1. Research topic: 1-2 sentences describing your research topic or research question
- 2. Introduction: 1 page on brief introduction to your research proposal
- 3. Literature review: 3-5 pages on what previous studies found on this research topic
- 4. Methods: 2-3 pages on how you will design a study to answer your research question
- 5. Whole draft: includes all the above, a title page, and a reference page, abstract is not needed

Academic dishonesty of any kind (e.g. plagiarism, cheating) will not be tolerated. Students found to have plagiarized or cheated will receive a failing grade for the course.
