**Recommended Text:** *Student Guidebook to Proper Citation in APA Style*

**COURSE DESCRIPTION:**

Philosophy and history of law enforcement; limitations imposed on law enforcement in a democratic society in accordance with the Constitution; agencies of law enforcement; role and place of law enforcement in the total justice process.

**COURSE OBJECTIVES:**

Through readings, videos, class discussions, and related exercises, the student will develop an understanding of the "complex relationship between police and society, to assist in making informed decisions about the many social issues facing the police institution" (*Gaines*).

Students will be able to:

- Explain the differences between policing in the past and contemporary policing.
- Compare the myths of policing to the reality of what the police actually do.

- Outline the factors that shape the police role.
- Critique the various forms and styles of policing.
- Recognize the problems of policing, including the exercise of discretion, legitimacy and community relations.

## COURSE REQUIREMENTS:

### Assignments and Test Details

**Exams** – There will be 2 tests worth 100 points each (50 questions multiple choice – source of questions - chapter reviews)

**Chapter Reviews** – Students will be required to access the 15 chapter reviews (20 questions each) online and complete them by the indicated dates for each of the chapters. Each question is worth 1 points for a total of 300 points. Complete one per week.

**Video and Article Reports** – Each student will download the 8 short writing assignments – some are short videos and some are longer, and same for articles. Try to pace yourself. Generally you are being asked to write a minimum of one page – more is acceptable. Less impacts your grade significantly. Each assignment has a value of 25 points. **Please use APA format in your writing – include a title page and bibliography page (if you use an outside source). Title page and bibliography have no page count. One inch margins and 12 point Times New Roman Font.**

## GRADING:

**Grading: Evaluation:** A = 90- 97 B = 80 – 89 C = 70-79 D = 60-69 F = 59 and below (+ and – between values )

To determine your grade take total points you earned and divide them by 1025.
