Course Learning Outcomes:

Upon successful completion of this course, students will be able to:

- Create an argument through the use of historical evidence.
- Analyze primary sources.
- Analyze the effects of historical, social, political, economic, cultural, and global forces on United States history.

Grading:

There will be a minimum of four exams throughout the semester each worth 100 points.

Regular source analysis quizzes will be worth 25 points each.

There will be five writing assignments worth 50 points each.

I will give 2 points per day per person as extra credit on the next exam for participating in course discussions. (If you ask 3 relevant questions and make 5 relevant comments in a day, you get 2 points.)

Quiz and Exam Schedule:

Quizzes are unannounced and can happen at any time in any class. Exams will be approximately every three weeks beginning the first week of class. There will be a review the class before each exam. Any changes in the exam schedule will be announced in class at least one week in advance.

The Day-to-Day:

This is a lecture and discussion-based course. It is designed to allow students to learn by engaging directly with primary sources. The class will consist of regular document examination and discussions as well as lectures. Print documents will be handed out in class. All assignments not completed in class <u>must</u> be typed, printed, and stapled before turning them in. Note-taking, time management and other study skills will greatly improve your performance in the course.

Visitation to the classroom is limited to registered students only unless approved by the professor in advance. Although, there is no absence policy, there will be many in-class

assignments that <u>cannot</u> be made up and important announcements that will only be made in class. Good attendance is necessary for passing the class.

You are responsible for your own behavior in the classroom. Students who wish to fail by cellphone or other distractions will be allowed to do so. However, students will not distract others. <u>Basic courtesy</u> for the instructor and other students in the class <u>is required</u> for the successful completion of this course.

Amendments to Syllabus:

This document is subject to change at any time for any reason the professor sees fit. Alterations will be announced in class with plenty of advanced notice.

Student Absences on Religious Holy Days Policy:

Section 51.911(b) of the Texas Education Code requires that an institution of higher education excuse a student from attending classes or other required activities, including examinations, for the observance of a religious holy day, including travel for that purpose. Section 51.911 (a) (2) defines a religious holy day as: "a holy day observed by a religion whose places of worship are exempt from property taxation under Section 11.20...." A student whose absence is excused under this subsection may not be penalized for that absence and shall be allowed to take an examination or complete an assignment from which the student is excused within a reasonable time after the absence.

University policy 861001 provides the procedures to be followed by the student and instructor. A student desiring to absent himself/herself from a scheduled class in order to observe (a) religious holy day(s) shall present to each instructor involved a written statement concerning the

religious holy day(s). The instructor will complete a form notifying the student of a reasonable timeframe in which the missed assignments and/or examinations are to be completed.
