Course Description: Topics include a brief review of introductory algebra, variation, elementary theory of equations, functions (including exponential and logarithmic) inequalities, systems of equations, and other related topics.

Prerequisites: Two years of high school algebra and one year of high school geometry. Credit 3.

Course Objectives: This course is designed for those students who need preparation beyond two years of high school geometry before taking the calculus sequence. In this course the student is expected to obtain an understanding of:

- The principles involved in the algebra of real and complex numbers
- The concept of a function and how to use algebraic and geometric properties to study properties of functions
- How to use functions and algebraic principles to model and solve real-world problems

Required Textbook: *College Algebra*, 8th edition, by Aufmann

Required Supplies: You must have a calculator that can evaluate roots, powers, exponentials, and logarithms (a scientific calculator will do this)

EVALUATION PROCEDURES:

- ❖ **Homework/ Quizzes (20%):** Homework will be assigned as sections are completed in lecture. All homework is due on exam day but you should be keeping up with homework on a daily basis. Periodically quizzes will be given. There will be NO make-up quizzes given (so come to class on time each day), but your lowest quiz grade is dropped at the end of the semester. Most quizzes will be given at the beginning of class. Each quiz will count as one grade and each set of unit homework will count as one grade. The average of these will be worth 20% of your total grade.

- ❖ **Unit Exams (15% each exam):** There will be four unit exams during the semester, for a total of 60%.
- ❖ **Final Exam (20%):** The final exam will be comprehensive. It is NOT optional. If it is beneficial, your final exam grade can replace your lowest unit exam grade.
- ❖ **Make-up Policy:** You cannot make-up an exam, homework assignment or quiz. Missing assignments are given zero points.

Attendance: You should attend all classes and are responsible for all notes, announcements, assignments, quizzes, and exams. If you must miss class, notify me via email as soon as possible as to why you were not in class or will not be attending class. An absence is excused only in cases of medical emergencies, death in the family, or school sponsored events. To excuse an absence, you must provide legitimate documentation (for example, a doctor's note or official university excuse) no later than the day that you return to class.

Academic Dishonesty: All students are expected to engage in all academic pursuits in a manner that is above reproach. Students are expected to maintain complete honesty and integrity in the academic experiences both in and out of the classroom. Any student found guilty of dishonesty in any phase of academic work will be subject to disciplinary action. The University and its official representatives may initiate disciplinary proceedings against a student accused of any form of academic dishonesty including, but not limited to, cheating on an examination or other academic work which is to be submitted, plagiarism, collusion and the abuse of resource materials.

Classroom Rules of Conduct: Students will refrain from behavior in the classroom that intentionally or unintentionally disrupts the learning process and, thus, impedes the mission of the university. Students are prohibited from using tobacco products in class, making offensive remarks, reading newspapers, sleeping, talking at inappropriate times, wearing inappropriate clothing or engaging in any other form of distraction. Inappropriate behavior in the classroom shall result in a directive to leave class. Students who are especially disruptive also may be reported to the Dean of Students for disciplinary action in accordance with university policy.

Use of Telephones and Text Messaging: Cellular telephones must be turned off before class begins. Failure to comply with this instructor's policy could result in expulsion from the classroom or with multiple offenses, failure of the course. Arrangements for handling potential emergency situations may be granted at the discretion of the instructor. Any use of a telephone

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or text messenger or any device that performs these functions during a test period is prohibited. These devices should not be present during a test or should be stored securely in such a way that they cannot be seen or used by the student. Even the visible presence of such a device during the test period will result in a zero for that test. Use of these devices during a test is considered de facto evidence of cheating and could result in a charge of academic dishonesty.

Visitors in the Classroom: Unannounced visitors to class must present a current, official SHSU identification card to be permitted in the classroom. They must not present a disruption to the class by their attendance. If the visitor is not a registered student, it is at the instructor's discretion whether or not the visitor will be allowed to remain in the classroom.

Student Absences on Religious Holy Days Policy: Section 51.911(b) of the Texas Education Code requires that an institution of higher education excuse a student from attending classes or other required activities, including examinations, for the observance of a religious holy day, including travel for that purpose. A student whose absence is excused under this subsection may not be penalized for that absence and shall be allowed to take an examination or complete an assignment from which the student is excused within a reasonable time after the absence.

University policy 861001 provides the procedures to be followed by the student and instructor. A student desiring to absent himself/herself from a scheduled class in order to observe (a) religious holy day(s) shall present to each instructor involved a written statement concerning the religious holy day(s). This request must be made in the first fifteen days of the semester or the first seven days of a summer session in which the absence(s) will occur. The instructor will complete a form notifying the student of a reasonable time frame in which the missed assignments and/or examinations are to be completed.
