

COURSE DESCRIPTION—The focus of this course relates to those who are poor, minorities, the aging and others for whom the criminal justice system appears to have a biased approach. The course combines a historical perspective along with current issues related to these populations' interaction with the criminal justice system. There will be some pre-conceived notions challenged and others confirmed, with the end goal of a deeper understanding of issues facing these populations.

COURSE OBJECTIVES

- 1. Understand the underlying theories explaining minority interactions as well as other populations who may experience biases in the Criminal Justice system.
- 2. Analyze the historical perspective and current trends related to minority populations and criminal justice.
- 3. Explore the role police, courts and corrections have in social diversity and criminal justice.

COURSE REQUIREMENTS – During this course you are required to complete the following: Four **Checkpoint Assignments**- The general rules for these assignments are as follows

 \Box At least 2 paragraphs.

- The question(s) should be clearly stated at the top of the assignment
- A clear and concise answer to the question(s) in a well-organized format with appropriate grammar and flow

Maximum credit for each assignment is 25 points for a total of 100 points. If the checkpoint includes a discussion you must answer the question in the 2 paragraph format and respond to a classmate with at least one paragraph) to receive full credit. Checkpoints/Discussions are assigned at the beginning of a unit and are due on the same day as the Exam for each unit.

Exams-There will be five exams administered during the semester. Each exam is worth 60 points and will include multiple choice and true false. The final exam (exam 5) is comprehensive. There are a total of 300 points available through exams.

GRADING—Please ensure that you monitor your grades and know unless you are on the verge of a higher grade (ie 89.6) consideration will not be given to change grades.
