COURSE DESCRIPTION:

This course emphasizes the study of legal clearances, budgeting, funding, resource management, and scheduling as these activities relate to radio and television production.

This course will be taught incorporating text, on-line discussion, notes and field assignments. This class requires participation in online discussion forums and completing scheduled assignments and quizzes.

Visitors in the Classroom

Unannounced visitors to class must present a current, official SHSU identification card to be permitted into the classroom. They must not present a disruption to the class by their attendance. If the visitor is not a registered student, it is at the instructor's discretion whether or not the visitor will be allowed to remain in the classroom.
