

ECON 2300(01): INTRODUCTION TO ECONOMICS (CRN: 20060)
An Online Course
Spring 2018

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Office Hours: MW 10:30 - 11:30 AM, or by Appointment.

Since it is an online course, most of the time you will be interacting with me over phone, fax, email, blackboard etc.; however when you are on-campus you can always visit me during my office hours.

Course Description: This is an introductory undergraduate-level course designed to expose students to elementary and basic concepts in microeconomics as well as macroeconomics. The first half of the semester will discuss topics related to microeconomics such as, demand & supply, cost of production and different forms of markets (competitive and monopoly). The second half of the semester will be devoted to macroeconomics aspects of the economy such as GDP & Growth, consumer price index, inflation, monetary system, aggregate demand & supply. Graphs and simple algebra will be used to simplify the comprehension of the concepts central to economic theory.

Learning Outcomes: By the end of this course, students should be able to learn:

1. Develop an understanding of fundamental principles, generalizations, and theories in economics
2. Gain some factual knowledge about the US economy
3. Learn how to apply course materials to critically evaluate economic issues.

IDEA Course Evaluation Learning Objectives:

Towards the end of the semester, you will be required to complete a course evaluation survey. The survey will be administered online through Blackboard. You are encouraged to complete the survey in reference to the following two main learning objectives of this course:

- **Gaining a basic understanding of the subject (e.g., factual knowledge, methods, principles, generalizations, theories)**
- **Learning to *apply* course material (to improve thinking, problem solving, and decisions)**

Required Text: Foundations of Economics by Bade and Parkin, 8th edition (ISBN: 0134486811). Or older edition if it is cheaper. But you will be responsible for matching the materials between 8th edition and the older editions. I will be using 8th edition for my lectures.

Blackboard

All course materials including syllabus, lecture notes, practice questions, videos will be uploaded on blackboard. However, these course materials are not a substitute for the book, therefore, you are required to read the book and comprehend the material- the blackboard materials are meant to aid your understanding of the book. **READING THE ASSIGNED TEXT IS A MUST TO DO WELL IN THIS CLASS.**

Tutoring

The Department of Economics & International Business offers free tutoring for all students enrolled in economics classes. Tutoring is held in the afternoon in Room 108, on Monday-Friday from 11:00-4:30pm in Smith-Hutson Business Building.

Evaluation

Each student will be evaluated on the basis of his or her performance in the exams and weekly quizzes.

1. **Exams (80%):** There will be four mid-term exams and one comprehensive final exam. However, you may miss one of the exams as the best FOUR out of the FIVE exams will be considered for the final course grade. Each exam will be worth 20% of the final grade. Each mid-term exam will be on-line and will have 40 multiple-choice questions. Final exam will have 50 questions.

Each exam will be timed and will be available for ONE week and students will have 2 hours to complete it. For example, if you open the exam at 11am, then you are supposed to complete it by 1pm as you have only 2 hours to complete it. All exams will be due on 11.59pm (not 11.59am) on the last day of its availability.

Without exception, no additional time will be given to complete the exam, and under no circumstances will the exam deadline will be extended. To avoid last minute personal/family emergencies or technical glitches, students are advised to take the exams atleast 2 days before the deadline. If you wait till the last day to take the exam, then you risk an unforeseen event forcing you to take a zero in that exam. In case you miss an exam due to unforeseen circumstances, then the missed exam will be replaced by 40% weightage of the final exam.

2. **Quizzes (20%):** There will be 10 quizzes. Each quiz will consist of 20 multiple choice questions. The best 5 quizzes (out of 10) will count for 20% of the final grade. Quizzes will open on Wednesday at 11:59pm and will be due on Sunday midnight.

Exam Administration

Exams will be proctored and monitored by a software “ProctorFree”. ProctorFree is inbuilt in the course and you should access exams only through ProctorFree. Read the instructions on how to use ProctorFree (see the tab on the left on your course homepage).

Having a webcam is a mandatory requirement for this course. Exams are closed book and cheating or use of unfair means will result into an F.

ProctorFree Rule

1. Students are allowed to use scratch paper and calculator during the exam but before starting the exam, show them in the camera, and also show the testing environment before starting the exam.
2. Exams are closed book.
3. You should access exams only through “ProctorFree” link. If you access exams through any other links, you will receive ZERO.

Section 51.911(b) of the Texas Education Code requires that an institution of higher education excuse a student from attending classes or other required activities, including examinations, for the observance of a religious holy day, including travel for that purpose. Section 51.911 (a) (2) defines a religious holy day as: “a holy day observed by a religion whose places of worship are exempt from property taxation under Section 11.20....” A student whose absence is excused under this subsection may not be penalized for that absence and shall be allowed to take an examination or complete an assignment from which the student is excused within a reasonable time after the absence.

University policy 861001 provides the procedures to be followed by the student and instructor. A student desiring to absent himself/herself from a scheduled class in order to observe (a) religious holy day(s) shall present to each instructor involved a written statement concerning the religious holy day(s).
