ECON 2301: Principles of Macroeconomics An Online Course Spring 2018

<u>Course Description</u>: This introductory course in macroeconomics focuses on the functioning of the overall economy. The goal is to explain the economy-wide changes that affect many households, firms, and markets simultaneously. In order to achieve this goal, it first discusses some of the data that economists and policymakers use to monitor the performance of the overall economy, such as gross domestic product (GDP), general price level and inflation, unemployment rate, and interest rate. This course uses an analytical framework that consists of simplified models to explain the issues of economic growth and business cycle fluctuations. It also briefly discusses macroeconomic policy debates and selected issues in international trade and finance.

Course Objectives: The student will have learned to

- (i) understand fundamental principles, generalizations, and theories to develop an understanding of how the overall economy works;
- (ii) gain factual knowledge about the basic institutions of the U.S. economy that influence overall economic outcomes through monetary and fiscal policy;
- (iii) apply course materials to improve thinking, problem solving, and decisions.

<u>Required Textbook</u>: Foundations of Economics (Eighth Edition) by Robin Bade and Michael Parkin, Pearson.

<u>Blackboard</u>: Syllabus, PowerPoint Lecture Slides, Practice Question Sets, and Quizzes will be uploaded on Blackboard. Also, the grades will be posted on it.

Evaluation:

Exam

There will be three midterm exams and a final exam. <u>The final exam is mandatory</u>. However, the student may choose not to take *or* miss one midterm. If he/she takes all three midterm exams, the best two will be counted towards his/her course grade. Each of the best three midterm exams will count 20% of the final grade. Each midterm exam will consist of 40 multiple choice questions and the maximum grade points will be 20. The final exam will consist of 60 multiple choice questions and the maximum grade points will be 30. <u>ProctorFree software will be used to administer the exams</u>. Detailed Instructions are posted separately on Blackboard.

Quiz

There will be 12 quizzes. Each quiz will consist of 10 multiple choice questions. The best 10 quizzes (out of 12) will count 30% of the overall grade. Each quiz will be graded on a scale of 0 - 3 points.

<u>Under no circumstances</u> will individual extra credit assignments be given, as it is not fair to other students.

At the end of the semester, the grade points received in the best 2 midterm exams, best 10 quizzes, and the final exam will be added and a letter grade will be assigned according to the following scale:
